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



incentive amounting to Php3 million for the said award.

In addition, 19 Local Government Units (LGUs) from Iloilo also bagged their SGLG awards including Alimodian, Anilao, Banate, Bingawan, Cabatuan, Concepcion, Lambunao, Leganes, Maasin, Mina, New Lucena, Oton, Pavia, Pototan, San Enrique, Tigbauan, Tubungan, Zarraga, and Passi City.

For the said award, Passi City received Php2 million, while the 18 municipalities got Php1.153 million each.

Municipal mayors received the awards for their LGUs, except for Passi City Mayor Stephen Palmares and Lambunao Mayor Reynor Gonzales.

The SGLG is the DILG's highest award for LGUs that excel in ten key governance areas.

To qualify, at least 10% of the province's cities and municipalities must be SGLG passers.

The Iloilo Province was determined on the following governance areas such as:

- * Financial Administration and Sustainability
- * Disaster Preparedness,
- *Social Protection and Sensitivity
- * Health Compliance and Responsiveness
- * Sustainable Education
- * Business-Friendliness and Competitiveness
- * Safety
- * Peace and Order
- * Environmental Management
- * Tourism
- * Heritage Development
- * Culture and Arts
- * Youth Development

Iloilo Province won SGLG awards in 2015, 2016, 2017, 2018, 2022, and 2023, becoming the first province to win four straight years from 2015 to 2018.

Management Office (POSMO) on Monday, December 9. According to Treñas, the Traffic and Transportation Management Office (TTMO) will still be headed by Garbanzos as his concurrent position.

As the newly appointed Public Safety department head, Garbanzos stated that he will be focusing and prioritizing the city's matters such as best practices, new system, implementation of operational plans, and security operations in collaborative efforts and coordination with the City Peace and Order Council chaired by Mayor Treñas.

"This is the whole city so there are transport units under us. I've been looking if there are major events here in Iloilo City that we can provide attention, in collaboration with other law enforcement agencies," Garbanzos said.

Garbanzos added that Public Safety's ultimate goal is to accomplish or achieve zero major incidents within the city.

Meanwhile, Mr. Jay Vincent Mabilog will also remain as the POSMO Assistant Head.

The official appointment of Garbanzos was initially signed by Treñas and was also approved by the members of Sangguniang Panlungsod (SP) or Iloilo City Council during their session on Tuesday, December 10.

MGen more prepared in the event of power outage in WV

The Meralco Power Generation Corp (MGen) assured the public that they are now more prepared in the event that a massive power outage happens again in Western Visayas.

In a press conference on December 10 at Amarillo in Iloilo City Proper, MGen Thermal Energy Corp. (MThermal) President Mr. Jaime Azurin said their biggest unit with 150 megawatts is undergoing a major overhaul and has been replaced and improved.

Azurin added that Palm Concepcion Power Corporation (PCPC) based in Concepcion, Iloilo is also reliable as they had already fixed and improved their system.

He also emphasized that the Cebu-Negros-Panay (CNP) Grid was already done by the National Grid Corporation of the Philippines (NGCP). It is a 230 kV backbone system which strengthens the power transmission in the islands of Cebu, Negros, and Panay.

Panay Energy Development Corporation (PEDC) also has 150 megawatts after having a 45-day overhaul which could help to suffice the electricity in the region.

Azurin stressed that there are already many power sources in case of a power outage to happen.

To recall, a four-day massive blackout hit Western Visayas last January 2-5, 2024 particularly in Panay Island, Guimaras, Negros, and other areas which also resulted to economic losses in both city and province of Iloilo.

In celebration of worship and devotion for Immaculate Conception, a new Queen was enthroned during the coronation night of Kapistahan 2024 in Calinog Astrodome on December 8.

The event was spearheaded by Mayor Francisco "Ico" Calvo wherein Victoria Uychocde was crowned as queen.

It was also attended by local officials including 3rd district Board Member Jason Gonzales, Iloilo City Vice Mayor Jeffrey Ganzon, Bingawan Mayor Mark Palabrica, and some municipal officials.

According to Calinog Municipal Administrator Ms. Rachel Manero, the week-long festivity from December 1-8, particularly the coronation, symbolizes the faith and devotion of Calinognons to Immaculate



Conception.

"This is a religious fiesta in the Municipality of Calinog, it's December 8 but it has been a part of the tradition of the municipality to start on December 1," Manero said. The event was bigger compared to the previous years as it has been a struggle for the said municipality to conduct such events during the pandemic.

Meanwhile, Manero also stated that the newly

crowned queen not only symbolized the faith of Calinognons for their patron saint, but also serves as an ambassadress or the face of Calinog when it comes to representations outside the municipality.

Peace center to rise in Negros Occidental

ILOILO CITY – Negros Occidental will be one of the first areas in the Philippines to establish a peace center aimed at integrating peace-related initiatives from the provincial and national governments and other stakeholders.

During a media briefing on Wednesday, Juniel Guath, from the Western Visayas Area Management Unit of the Office of the Presidential Adviser on Peace, Reconciliation, and Unity (OPAPRU), shared that this peace center is part of a broader effort to implement Localized Peace Engagement (LPE) and the Transformation Program (TP) across the country.

"We have already downloaded the first tranche of the PHP5 million budget for the operationalization of a peace center to the provincial government of Negros Occidental," Guath said, adding that they target to establish the center in Iloilo by 2025.

She also mentioned that peace centers will be set up in other provinces.

Guath explained that LPE focuses on addressing issues that fuel insurgency and seeks peace settlements with the Communist Party of the Philippines-New People's Army-National Democratic Front (CPP-NPA-NDF), leading to the surrender of insurgents.

"The LPE and its TP integrate various National Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (NTF-ELCAC) efforts on the ground, aiming to sustain former rebels and promote community resilience." she added.

By 2028, the identified programs and projects under LPE TP are expected to be implemented, with approval from local councils and funding from national agencies. (PNA)

Antique gets first-class status, seal of good local governance award

SAN JOSE DE BUENAVISTA, Antique – Antiqueños can expect improved services after the reclassification of Antique as a first-class province and its conferment with a Seal of Good Local Governance (SGLG) award.

Antique's more than PHP450 million annual average revenue from taxes and other fund sources led to the new classification from its previous second-class status, by the Department of Finance last week.

Acting Provincial Planning and Development Officer Bienvenido Nallos Jr., in an interview on Wednesday, said the feat would inspire provincial leaders to work harder and open access to funding for priority projects.

"Antique's reclassification into a first-class province and as an SGLG awardee will open more economic opportunities and better access to loans or grants that will benefit the people," he said, attributing the achievement to the province's growing economy and responsible leadership.

Nallos and heads of the provincial government



offices joined Governor Rhodora Cadiao in receiving the SGLG award in Manila on Dec. 9.

He said for the third time, the province is an awardee after passing all governance areas, including financial administration and sustainability; disaster preparedness; social protection and sensitivity; health compliance and responsiveness; sustainable education; business-friendliness and competitiveness; safety, peace and order; environmental management; tourism, heritage development, culture and arts and youth development.

"We will still have a meeting with the governor next week to identify the project that would be funded from the SGLG incentive," Nallos said.

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
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With the first impeachment complaint against Vice President Sara Duterte filed by civil society organizations before the House of Representatives on Dec. 2, and a second one filed by the Makabayan bloc only days later, the stage is now set for the possibility of the second highest elective official in the country to be ousted from office.

This is a first in the nation's political history.

The impeachment complaints against the sitting vice president are in accord with Article 11 of the 1987 Constitution that says the President, Vice President, members of the Supreme Court, members of the Constitutional Commissions and the Ombudsman may be removed from office for culpable violation of the Constitution, treason, bribery, graft and corruption, other high crimes, and betrayal of public trust.

The 50-page impeachment complaint filed by religious leaders, sectoral representatives and families of drug war victims, endorsed by the Akbayan party-list representative, cites all the reasons for impeachment enumerated in the fundamental law, except for treason, and contains a total of 24 articles.

The second impeachment complaint drafted by the Makabayan bloc and other progressive groups focuses on a single issue—betrayal of public trust by

the VP, specifically her alleged misuse of confidential funds

The next step is for the House Committee on Justice to determine whether the impeachment complaints are sufficient in form and substance. If it does so, then these will be forwarded to the Senate for trial.

The filing of the impeachment complaints against Sara Duterte immediately follows President Marcos Jr.'s statement that he would prefer not to have the vice president impeached as this would take up too much time and derail efforts by the legislature and the government as a whole to focus on addressing economic issues.

But the vice president may have had it coming ever since the House committee on good government and public accountability unearthed various issues at the Office of the Vice President and the Department of Education.

Last month, the House panel discovered that the special disbursing officers of OVP and DepEd had left the disbursement of confidential funds to her security officers, which is tantamount to technical malversation.

Prior to this, legislators also found possible irregularities in the acknowledgement receipts for OVP and DepEd's confidential fund expenses.

But the calls for Duterte's impeachment mounted after her recent online press conference where she said she has contracted someone to kill the President, First Lady and House Speaker if she is targeted for assassination.

If the House plenary endorses the impeachment complaints against Sara Duterte, then it becomes a numbers game in the Senate where it would take three-fourths of 23 sitting senators or 16 of them to convict her and remove her from the vice presidency, which would prevent her from getting elected or appointed to any public office in the future.

Which way will it go? Well, no one can tell at this point.

We'll have to wait and see whether the House does its part in record time and the senators vote according to the available evidence, not on political grounds.

Not to forget, there could even be more impeachment complaints filed against the VP in the days ahead. (manilastandard.net)

From overseas contract workers to overseas Filipino workers today

Did you know that when some of the Filipino labor force began leaving to find jobs in other countries, such groups of workers were simply called overseas contract workers (OCWs) instead of overseas Filipino workers or OFWs, like today?

This can be gleaned from a section of the 1994 Philippine Yearbook published in April 1995 by the former National Statistics Office (NSO), now the Philippine Statistics Authority or PSA.

Then NSO Administrator Tomas Africa said the yearbook was the 12th in a series of annual reports published by the NSO to provide the readers, both local and foreign, with a detailed socioeconomic profile of the country.

It included a special feature that focused on human development, an important aspect of the Medium-Term Philippine Development Plan (MTPDP) of the administration of then President Fidel V. Ramos (June 30, 1992-June 30, 1998).

Each of the key government departments and agencies -- dealing with such indicators as agriculture and fisheries, economy, budget, and banking, defense and law enforcement, demography, education, health and welfare, labor and employment, mining and minerals, trade, transportation, etc. -- contributed articles and narratives highlighting their achievements and contributions to the country's economic development and progress.

In its narration in the yearbook, particularly in Chapter 15 titled: "Labor, Overseas Employment and Emigration," the Department of Labor and

Did you know that when some of the Filipino labor Employment (DOLE) traced the beginning of Filipino ce began leaving to find jobs in other countries, labor migration.

It said there are two mainstreams of manpower outflow from the country. The first is permanent migration, wherein workers leave on a more or less permanent basis, and the second is a contract or temporary migration, a case of contractual employment for a definite period of time with the workers intending to return to their home country after contract termination.

The movement of Filipino workers in the first category can be traced to the early 1900s when Hawaii experienced a severe shortage of plantation workers. The Philippines, then an American colony, was the source of cheap labor.

The United States was the main market for Filipino overseas workers and, by the late 1930s, Filipinos comprised about 70 percent of Hawaii's plantation labor as well as a significant percentage of California's grape, apple, and orange-picking population.

The next wave of contract migration came after World War II when Filipino contractors and laborers participated in the rehabilitation and reconstruction of American strongholds such as Guam, Okinawa and Wake Island.

The outbreak of the Korean and Vietnam wars later institutionalized Filipino participation in many US defense and war-related civilian projects.

At the same time, manpower markets began opening up in Borneo, Thailand, Malaysia and Indonesia. Canada also provided an alternative

destination for professional and medical personnel who sought permanent migration to the North American continent.

In the 1970s, then Labor Secretary Blas F. Ople suggested to then President Ferdinand E. Marcos Sr. that it was time for the government to begin contract migration to the Middle East. Fueled by the development boom resulting from increased oil prices, oil-producing Arab countries started requiring skilled manpower more than their indigenous population could supply.

The Philippine Overseas Employment Administration (POEA) said the processed overseas contract workers increased from 314,234 in 1982 to 598,769 in 1990, most of them bound for the Middle East. Of the total, 468,591 were land-based workers and 130,178 were sea-based.

In the mid-1990s, there was a revision in the acronym OCWs to OFWs or overseas Filipino workers upon the initiative of then President Fidel V. Ramos "to highlight that Filipinos abroad are not only overseas contract workers but also expatriates and highly-skilled individuals with high-paying jobs coveted by large corporations."

In the 2021 book "Behind the Red Pen" written by veteran writer and former presidential reporter Jojo T. Terencio, the late former president was quoted as saying: "We should institutionalize the use of 'OFW' to refer to Filipinos working overseas. It is more inclusive."

Towards a safe Philippines for children

"Each day of our lives, we make deposits in the memory banks of our children," wrote Charles R. Swindoll.

But how can we make meaningful deposits in these memory banks when violence against children remains alarmingly prevalent in the Philippines? According to the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), nearly 8 in 10 Filipino children have experienced some form of violence —whether at home, in school, or within their communities. This grim reality persists despite the passage of numerous laws and the implementation of various programs aimed at safeguarding children's welfare.

This troubling fact calls for deep reflection as the Philippines celebrates National Children's Month (NCM) this November. The celebration commemorates the adoption of the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) by the United Nations General Assembly in November 1989. The Philippines ratified the CRC in August 1990, just nine months after its adoption, affirming the country's commitment to recognizing and upholding the rights of individuals under the age of 18. as enshrined in the convention.

This year's NCM theme, "Break the Prevalence, End the Violence: Protecting Children, Creating a Safe Philippines," highlights the urgent need to address the pervasive violence that endangers Filipino children. It calls on all Filipinos to take collective action to dismantle the structures and conditions that perpetuate such abuse and neglect. The theme emphasizes both the urgency of the issue and the shared responsibility to protect children from harm.

Physical abuse, sexual exploitation, online sexual abuse, neglect, and bullying mar many Filipino children's daily lives. These experiences are more than individual tragedies; they reflect systemic failures to ensure children's safety and well-being. This year's theme clearly challenges us to build a society where children can grow and thrive fearlessly, surrounded by love, respect, and protection.

The impact of violence on children extends far beyond immediate physical harm, leaving emotional and psychological scars that can hinder their development and overall well-being. Victims are more likely to suffer from mental health issues such as depression, experience educational setbacks, and become vulnerable to further exploitation.

The rise of digital platforms has introduced alarming new risks. Online sexual exploitation of children (OSEC) has identified the Philippines as a global hotspot, with abuse broadcasting to victims as young as 2 years old. Poverty, inadequate parental supervision, and a growing global demand for exploitative materials fuel this disturbing trend.

UNICEF reported that online sexual abuse and exploitation of 2 million Filipino children occurred in 2021 alone. They groomed and coerced many of these children, often luring them with promises of gifts or money in exchange for performing sexual acts. They further threatened or blackmailed some of these children into compliance, trapping them in a cycle of abuse and fear.

Efforts to combat OSEC have led to numerous arrests in the Philippines and abroad. A particularly shocking case involved a graphic artist who had worked for Pixar and Disney, producers of computeranimated movies loved by children. In 2023, a French court sentenced him to 25 years in prison for ordering livestreamed sexual assaults on preteen girls in the Philippines. The court found him guilty of complicity in the rape of hundreds of girls, human trafficking, and accessing child pornography. Such cases highlight the horrific scale and complexity of crimes targeting Filipino children, leaving many to grapple with the sheer extent of this exploitation.

A heartbreaking reality is that some parents and relatives are complicit in the sexual exploitation of children, driven by the harsh realities of poverty. Financial desperation often leads families to rationalize or even participate in these exploitative acts, with OSEC being particularly pervasive. The high demand for exploitative materials and the lure of quick financial gain turn vulnerable children into commodities. This tragic cycle underscores how poverty not only strips families of financial stability but also erodes moral boundaries, leaving countless children at risk.

Addressing this crisis requires a multifaceted approach. Strict law enforcement is essential to dismantle trafficking networks and hold perpetrators accountable. At the same time, there must be meaningful efforts to alleviate poverty, empower families with sustainable livelihood programs, and educate communities about the profound and lifelong

harm caused by such exploitation. Only by addressing the root causes can the Philippines protect its children from falling victim to these horrific crimes.

Our ultimate vision is a safe Philippines, a nation that protects every Filipino child from all forms of violence, abuse, exploitation, and discrimination. This vision underpins the government's commitment to safeguarding children, exemplified by the establishment of the Committee for the Special Protection of Children (CSPC).

The committee coordinates efforts across sectors to prevent violence against children and to effectively respond to cases of abuse and exploitation.

Achieving this vision requires a collective effort, starting with strong partnerships. Collaboration among government agencies, non-governmental organizations (NGOs), the private sector, and international organizations is essential to pool resources, share expertise, and implement innovative solutions to address the complex challenges children face today. The CSPC plays a pivotal role in ensuring that these partnerships work seamlessly to create safer environments for children. By fostering cooperation, shared accountability, and championing this vision, the Philippines takes a significant step toward ensuring that every child grows up in a society that values and protects their dignity, rights, and future.

WHEREAS, the International Laws and Treaties provide the following:

- Convention on the Eliminations of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW). The CEDAW Convention is built on three foundational principles: non-discrimination, state obligation and substantive equality. It is an international legal instrument that requires countries to eliminate discrimination against women in all areas and promotes women's equal rights. CEDAW is often described as the international bill of rights for women.
- Beijing Platform for Actions. The Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action or BPfA is a landmark document for advancing the rights of women and gender equality worldwide agreed during the 4th World Conference on Women in 1995.
- Sustainable Development Goals. The SDGs are designed to end poverty, hunger, AIDS & discrimination against women & girls. SDG 5 aims to achieve gender equality and empower all girls and women.

WHEREAS, the National Laws of the Philippines also provide the following:

- RA 7192 Women In Nation Building Act. An Act promoting the integration of women as full and equal partners of men in development and nation building and for other purposes.
- RA 9710 The Magna Carta of Women. A comprehensive women's human rights law that seeks
 to eliminate discrimination through the recognition, protection, fulfillment, and promotion of the
 rights of Filipino women, especially those belonging in the marginalized sectors of the society.
- 3. RA 9262 The Anti-Violence Against Women and Their Children Act of 2004. It is a law the seeks to address the prevalence of violence against women and their children (VAWC) by their intimate partners like their husband or ex-husband, live-in partner or former live-in partner, boyfriend/girlfriend or ex-boyfriend/ex-girlfriend, dating partner or former dating partner.
- 4. RA 8353 The Anti-Rape Law of 1997.
- 5. RA 7877 Anti Sexual Harassment Act of 1995.
- 6. RA 11313 Safe Spaces Act or the Anti-Bastos Law.

WHEREAS, Section 447 of R.A. No. 7160, otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991, provides that "The Sanggunian, as a legislative body, shall enact ordinances, approve resolutions and appropriate funds for the general welfare of its inhabitants under Section 16 of this Code":

RESOLVED, as it is hereby Resolved, by the 14th Sangguniang Panlalawigan ng Iloilo to enact the following Provincial Ordinance:

PROVINCIAL ORDINANCE NO. 2024-323

AN ORDINANCE REPEALING PROVINCIAL ORDINANCE NO. 2012-094, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS THE 'REVISED ILOILO GAD CODE', AND HEREBY ENACTNG THE COMPREHENSIVE GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT CODE OF THE PROVINCE OF ILOILO

CHAPTER 1 GENERAL PROVISIONS

ARTICLE I TITLE, DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES, ATTAINMENT OF POLICIES, MANDATES, AND OTHER LEGAL BASES

SECTION 1. Short Title. This Ordinance shall be known and cited as the "2024 Iloilo Province Gender and Development Code", herein referred to as "2024 ILOILO GAD CODE".

SECTION 2. Declaration of Principles and Policies. Embodying the principles of gender and development, the Iloilo Provincial Government shall recognize every person regardless of sex, age, class, status, ethnicity, color, disability, religious and political beliefs as active partners in the development of the nation, asserting equality in their responsibilities and benefits equally from the results of development thereof. It shall also recognize their fundamental right to be free from any form of discrimination. It shall also respect the sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, and sex characteristics, herein referred to as "SOGIESC", of every individual.

The Iloilo Provincial Government, in its commitment to the establishment of a national and international order based on sustainable and equitable growth, undertakes to facilitate the realization of the full human potentials of male and female individuals towards the improvement of their lives, their families and their communities. It is also fully cognizant of the efforts of women and men, regardless of their SOGIESC towards empowerment and self-determination, and shall vigorously pursue and implement gender-responsive development policies, design integrated gender and development support systems, and implement measures to protect and promote their rights.

SECTION 3. Attainment of the Foregoing Principles. To attain the foregoing policies, the lloilo Provincial Government shall respect, protect, promote, and fulfill human rights and dignity and shall exert efforts to address all forms of discrimination, marginalization, and violence on the basis of gender.

3.1 The Iloilo Provincial Government, through its GAD Focal Point System, shall:

- Ensure that social justice is achieved and enjoyed by all women and men, in implementing
 programs and projects including those funded under foreign development assistance or
 foreign aid and grants through direct participation;
- Guarantee the inclusion of gender-responsive indicators in all its programs, projects, and services pursuant to the United Nations Declarations where the Philippine Government is a signatory; and,
- c. Review and recommend gender responsive local official issuances, regulations, and policies.
- 3.2 This Ordinance shall provide the Iloilo Provincial Government a policy direction to formulate programs and strategies that will:
 - a. Mainstream gender and development in sector development plans, programs and policies;
 - . Intensify GAD advocacy to address gender issues;
 - Strengthen public and private partnership to maximize efficiency and effectiveness of GAD programs and services;
 - d. Encourage, support and expand the participation of women and men, regardless of their SOGIESC in planning, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of various development programs and projects, and social services that will enhance the well-being of families such as, but are not limited to family planning, health, child care and nutrition;
 - Encourage, support and expand the participation of children, youth, women, men, senior citizens, solo parents, persons with disabilities, LGBTQIA+, members of the Indigenous Cultural Communities/Indigenous People, Overseas Filipinos, and other vulnerable and marginalized sectors in policy and decision-making;
 - f. Provide gender-responsive programs, projects and services in all phases of disaster particularly in prevention, mitigation, preparedness, response recovery, and rehabilitation;
 - g. Provide gender-responsive intervention for any persons who are victims of any form of gender-based violence;
 - Promote gender sensitivity in local media and various social media platforms;
 - Implement continuous capacity-building intervention and support services for women's economic empowerment; and,
 - Capacitate all focal persons of all Municipalities/City in the Province of Iloilo through the conduct GAD Training.

SECTION 4. *Related Principles.* To facilitate the development of full potential of women and other persons, the following rights defined and declared are hereby adopted in this Ordinance:

4.1 Under the United Nations Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW)

- a. Women have the right to the prevention of, and protection from, all forms of violence and coercion against their person, their freedom, their sexuality and their individuality;
- Women have the right to freely and fully participate, individually or collectively, in the political processes of their communities, and enjoy freedom of speech to express their views and beliefs;
- Women have the right to access necessary information and means for the full exercise of their reproductive choice in conformity with their beliefs and preferences;
- Women have the right to be assured of their economic welfare and security and to be paid equally based on the work they do;
- Women have the right to avail of loans and other forms of financial credit and to have equal access to jobs, benefits and social security;
- f. Women have the right to choose their spouse in accordance with their values and preferences, maintain equality in marriage or its dissolution and receive adequate support for the rearing and caring of their children;
- g. Women have the right to adequate, relevant and gender-fair education throughout their lives from childhood to adulthood;
- Women have the right to adequate nutrition, proper health care and humane living conditions;
- Women have the right to nurture their personhood, collectively and individually, to secure an image of themselves as whole and valuable beings, to build relationships based on respect, trust and mutuality; and.
- . Women have freedom of religion, the right to equality before the law, in principle and in practice.

4.2 Under the Yogyakarta Principles

- a. All human beings are born free and equal in dignity and rights. Human beings of all sexual orientations and gender identities are entitled to the full enjoyment of all human rights;
- b. Everyone is entitled to enjoy all human rights without discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity. Everyone is entitled to equality before the law and the equal protection of the law without any such discrimination whether or not the enjoyment of another human right is also affected:
- c. Everyone has the right to recognition everywhere as a person before the law. Persons of diverse sexual orientations and gender identities shall enjoy legal capacity in all aspects of life. Each person's self-defined sexual orientation and gender identity is integral to their personality and is one of the most basic aspects of self-determination, dignity and freedom;
- Everyone has the right to life. No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of life, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- e. Everyone, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity, has the right to security of the person and to protection by the State against violence or bodily harm, whether inflicted by government officials or by any individual or group;
- f. Everyone, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity, is entitled to the enjoyment of privacy without arbitrary or unlawful interference, including with regard to their family, home or correspondence as well as to protection from unlawful attacks on their honor and reputation;
- g. No one shall be subjected to arbitrary arrest or detention. Arrest or detention on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity, whether pursuant to a court order or otherwise, is arbitrary. All persons under arrest, regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity, are entitled, on the basis of equality, to be informed of the reasons for arrest and the nature of any charges against them, to be brought promptly before a judicial officer and to bring court proceedings to determine the lawfulness of detention, whether or not charged with any offense;

- h. Everyone is entitled to a fair and public hearing by a competent, independent and impartial tribunal established by law, in the determination of their rights and obligations in a suit at law and of any criminal charge against them, without prejudice or discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone deprived of liberty shall be treated with humanity and with respect for the inherent dignity of the human person. Sexual orientation and gender identity are integral to each person's dignity;
- Everyone has the right to be free from torture and from cruel, inhuman or degrading treatment or punishment, including for reasons relating to sexual orientation or gender
- Everyone is entitled to protection from trafficking, sale and all forms of exploitation, including but not limited to sexual exploitation, on the grounds of actual or perceived sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone has the right to decent and productive work, to just and favorable conditions of work and to protection against unemployment, without discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity:
- Everyone has the right to social security and other social protection measures, without discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone has the right to an adequate standard of living, including adequate food, safe drinking water, adequate sanitation and clothing, and to the continuous improvement of living conditions, without discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone has the right to adequate housing, including protection from eviction, without discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone has the right to education, without discrimination on the basis of, and taking into account, their sexual orientation and gender identity:
- Everyone has the right to the highest attainable standard of physical and mental health, without discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity. Sexual and reproductive health is a fundamental aspect of this right;
- No person may be forced to undergo any form of medical or psychological treatment, procedure, testing, or be confined to a medical facility, based on sexual orientation or gender identity. Notwithstanding any classifications to the contrary, a person's sexual orientation and gender identity are not, in and of themselves, medical conditions and are not to be treated, cured or suppressed;
- Everyone has the right to freedom of opinion and expression, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone has the right to freedom of peaceful assembly and association, including for the purposes of peaceful demonstrations, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone has the right to freedom of thought, conscience and religion, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity. These rights may not be invoked by the State to justify laws, policies or practices which deny equal protection of the law, or discriminate, on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone lawfully within a State has the right to freedom of movement and residence within the borders of the State, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity. Sexual orientation and gender identity may never be invoked to limit or impede a person's entry, egress or return to or from any State, including that person's own State;
- Everyone has the right to seek and enjoy in other countries asylum from persecution, including persecution related to sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone has the right to found a family, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity. Families exist in diverse forms. No family may be subjected to discrimination on the basis of the sexual orientation or gender identity of any of its members;
- Every citizen has the right to take part in the conduct of public affairs, including the right to stand for elected office, to participate in the formulation of policies affecting their welfare, and to have equal access to all levels of public service and employment in public functions, including serving in the police and military, without discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- Everyone has the right to participate freely in cultural life, regardless of sexual orientation or gender identity, and to express, through cultural participation, the diversity of sexual orientation and gender identity;
- aa. Everyone has the right, individually and in association with others, to promote the protection and realization of human rights at the national and international levels, without discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation or gender identity;
- ab. Every victim of a human rights violation, including of a violation based on sexual orientation or gender identity, has the right to effective, adequate and appropriate remedies; and,
- ac. Everyone whose human rights, including rights addressed in these Principles, are violated is entitled to have those directly or indirectly responsible for the violation, whether they are government officials or not, held accountable for their actions in a manner that is proportionate to the seriousness of the violation. There should be no impunity for perpetrators of human rights violations related to sexual orientation or gender identity.

SECTION 5. Mandates and Legal Bases. - The 2024 Iloilo GAD Code is based on the international policies, Philippine Constitution, various national laws and plans, and local mandates.

- Provincial Ordinance No. 2018-180, "An Ordinance Amending Provincial Ordinance No. 2017-139 Otherwise Known as "An Ordinance Creating the Iloilo Province Multisectoral STI, HIV and AIDS Prevention and Control Council and its Technical Working Group (TWG); for the Prevention and Control of Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI), Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV), Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS); Defining its Functions, Providing Response, Appropriating Funds, Imposing Penalties for Violations Thereof and Other Related Purposes.

ARTICLE II DEFINITION OF TERMS AND ACRONYMS

SECTION 6. Definition of Terms.

- 6.1 **Camp Management-** refers to ensuring the coordination and provision of assistance and protection to IDPs living in camps according to the legal protection framework and minimum humanitarian standards, encouraging IDP participation, managing IDP data and information, and maintaining camp facilities.
- 6.2 **Employee-** refers to a person, who exchange for remuneration, agrees to perform specified services for another person, whether natural or juridical, and whether private or public, who exercises fundamental control over the work, regardless of the term or duration of agreement or a person who is detailed to an entity under a subcontracting or second agreement.
- **Employer -** refers to a person who exercises control over an employee regardless of the status or conditions of the latter's employment or engagement.
- 6.4 **Empowerment -** active participation in decision-making, equal opportunity, economic freedom, and the right to give opinion, access to the productive resources that can make enable to increase the earnings. It is giving the strength to fight against any inequalities and getting self-respect and confidence
- **Ethnicity** the household member's identity, by blood and not by choice nor by adoption/ confirmation for any ethnic group, primarily the Indigenous Peoples.
- 6.6 **GAD Focal Point System** an interacting and interdependent group of people tasked to catalyze and accelerate gender mainstreaming in Iloilo Province.
- 6.7 **Gender** a set of socially ascribed characteristics, norms, roles, attitudes, values and expectations identifying the social behavior of men and women, and the relations between them.
- Gender and Development the development perspective and process that is participatory and empowering, equitable, sustainable, free from violence, respectful of human rights, supportive of self-determination and actualization of human potentials. It seeks to achieve gender equality as a fundamental value that should be reflected in development choices and contends that women are active agents of development, not just passive recipients of development; and stresses the need of women to organize themselves and participate in political processes to strengthen their legal rights.
- 6.9 Gender Analysis a framework to compare the relative advantages and disadvantages faced by women and men in various spheres of life, including the family, workplace, school, community, and political system.
- 6.10 Gender-Based Sexual Harassment unwelcome conduct based on an individual's actual or perceived orientation.
- 6.11 **Gender-Based Violence -** is violence committed against a person because of his or her sex or gender. It is forcing another person to do something against his or her will through violence, coercion, threats, deception, cultural expectations, or economic means.
- 6.12 Gender Discrimination- any distinction, exclusion or restriction made on the basis of socially constructed gender roles and norms that prevent a person, female or male, from enjoying full human rights.
- 6.13 **Gender Equity -** refers to the principle asserting the equality of men and women and their right to enjoy equal conditions realizing their full human potentials to contribute to and benefit from the results of development, and with the State recognizing that all human beings are free and equal in dignity and right.
- 6.14 **Gender Equality** refers to the fairness and justice in the distribution of benefits and responsibilities between women and men. Gender equity recognizes that men and women have different needs and power and that these should be identified and addressed in a manner that rectifies the imbalance between them. Thus, women-specific programs and policies may be needed to reach equality.
- 6.15 **Gender Expression -** is a person's external appearance, such as behavior, clothing, haircut or
- 6.16 **Gender Identity -** is a person's innermost concept of self as a woman, man, or another identity.
- **Gender Mainstreaming -** is a strategy to improve the quality of public policies, programs, and projects, ensuring more efficient allocation of resources.
- 6.18 **Gynecological Disorder -** is a disorder that would require surgical procedures such as, but not limited to, dilation and curettage and those involving female reproductive organs such as the vagina, cervix, uterus, fallopian tubes, ovaries, breast, adnexa and pelvic floor.
- 6.19 **Safe Spaces** any public or privately-owned spaces open to the public that adopt a zero-tolerance policy against gender-based harassment.
- 6.20 **Senior Citizen -** refers to any female or male resident citizen of the Philippines who is at least sixty (60) years old.
- 6.21 **Sex -** refers to male and female biological and physiological characteristics of an individual, natural and universal, constant across time, societies and culture.
- **Sex Characteristics -** are a person's physical traits such as hormones, genitalia, gonads, chromosomes, and reproductive organs.
- 6.23 **Sex, Age, and Disability Disaggregated Data -** measure social and economic differences between women and men. These data help assess if an initiative is successful at targeting and benefiting women, men, girls, and boys and unpack the differentiated impacts of disasters.
- 6.24 Sexual Harassment
 - a. Gender-Based Streets and Public Spaces Sexual Harassment
 - The crimes of gender-based streets and public spaces sexual harassment are committed through any unwanted and uninvited sexual actions or remarks against any person regardless of the motive for committing such action or remarks.
 - b. Gender-Based Online Sexual Harassment
 - includes acts that use information and communications technology in terrorizing and intimidating victims through physical, psychological, and emotional threats, unwanted sexual misogynistic, transphobic, homophobic and sexist remarks and comments online whether publicly or through direct and private messages, invasion of victim's privacy through cyberstalking and incessant messaging, uploading and sharing without the consent of the victim, any form of media that contains photos, voice, or video with sexual content, any unauthorized recording and sharing of any of the victim's photos, videos, or any information online, impersonating identities of victims online or posting lies about victims to harm their reputation, or filing false abuse reports to online platforms to silence victims.
 - :. Gender-Based Sexual Harassment in the Workplace
 - The crime of gender-based sexual harassment in the workplace includes the following:
 - (a) An act or series of acts involving any unwelcome sexual advances, requests or demand for sexual favors or any act of sexual nature, whether done verbally, physically or through the use of technology such as text messaging or electronic mail or through any other forms of information and communication systems, that has or could have a detrimental effect on the conditions of an individual's employment or education, job performance or opportunities;
 - (b) A conduct of sexual nature and other conduct-based on sex affecting the dignity of a person, which is unwelcome, unreasonable, and offensive to the recipient, whether

- done verbally, physically or through the use of technology such as text messaging or electronic mail or through any other forms of information and communication systems;
- (c) A conduct that is unwelcome and pervasive and creates an intimidating, hostile or humiliating environment for the recipient: Provided, That the crime of gender-based sexual harassment may also be committed between peers and those committed to a superior officer by a subordinate, or to a teacher by a student, or to a trainer by a trainee; and,
- (d) Information and communication system refers to a system for generating, sending, receiving, storing or otherwise processing electronic data messages or electronic documents and includes the computer system or other similar devices by or in which data are recorded or stored and any procedure related to the recording or storage of electronic data messages or electronic documents.
- d. Gender-Based Sexual Harassment in Educational and Training Institutions
 - Any form of gender-based sexual harassment that happened in educational and training institutions.
- 6.25 **Sexual Orientation -** a person's inherent or immutable enduring emotional, romantic or sexual attraction to other people.
- 6.26 **Social Protection -** constitutes policies and programs that seek to reduce poverty and vulnerability and to enhance the social status and rights of the marginalized that can be achieved through promoting and protecting livelihood and employment, protecting against hazards and sudden loss of income and improving people's capacity to manage or handle risks.
- 6.27 **Solo Parent -** refers to any individual who falls under any of the following category:
 - a. a parent who provides sole parental care and support of the child or children due to:
 - birth as a consequence of rape, even without final conviction: Provided, that the mother has the sole parental care and support of the child or children;
 - 2. death of the spouse;
 - detention of the spouse for at least three (3) months or service of sentence for a criminal conviction;
 - physical or mental incapacity of the spouse as certified by a public or private medical practitioner;
 - 5. legal separation or de facto separation for at least six (6) months, and the solo parent is entrusted with the sole parental care and support of the child or children; and,
 - declaration of nullity or annulment of marriage, as decreed by a court recognized by law, or due to divorce, subject to existing laws, and the solo parent is entrusted with the sole parental care and support of the child or children;
 - b. spouse or any family member of an Overseas Filipino Worker (OFW), or the guardian of the child or children of an OFW: Provided, that the said OFW belongs to the low/semiskilled worker category and is away from the Philippines for an uninterrupted period of twelve (12) months:
 - c. unmarried mother or father who keeps and rears the child or children:
 - any legal guardian, adoptive or foster parent who solely provides parental care and support to a child or children;
 - e. any relative within the fourth (4th) civil degree of consanguinity or affinity of the parent or legal guardian who assumes parental care and support of the child or children as a result of the death, abandonment, disappearance or absence of the parents or solo parent for at least six (6) months: Provided, that in cases of solo grandparents who are senior citizens but who have the sole parental care and support over their grandchildren who are unmarried, or unemployed and twenty-two years old or below, or those twenty-two (22) years old or over but who are unable to fully take care or protect themselves from abuse, neglect, cruelty, exploitation or discrimination because of a physical or mental disability or condition; and,
 - f. a pregnant woman who provides sole parental care and support to her unborn child or children.
- 6.28 **Sustainable Development -** development that meets the needs of the present, without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.
- 6.29 **Violence Against Children -** refers to all forms of physical or mental violence, injury or abuse, neglect or negligent treatment, maltreatment or exploitation, including sexual abuse.
- 6.30 Violence Against Women any act or series of acts committed by any person against a woman who is one's wife, former wife, or against a women with whom the person has or had a sexual or dating relationship, or with whom a person has a common child, or against her child whether marital or non-marital, within or without the family abode, which result in or is likely to result in physical, sexual, psychological harm or suffering, or economic abuse including threats of such acts, battery, assault, coercion, harassment, or arbitrary deprivation of liberty. It includes, but is not limited to, the following acts:
 - a. Physical Violence refers to acts that include bodily or physical harm.
 - b. Sexual Violence refers to an act which is sexual in nature, committed against a woman or her child. It includes, but is not limited to, the following:
 - i. Rape, sexual harassment, acts of lasciviousness, treating a woman or her child as a sex object, making demeaning and sexually suggestive remarks, physically attacking the sexual parts of the victim's body, forcing him/her to watch obscene publications and indecent shows or forcing the woman or her child to do indecent acts and/or make films thereof, forcing the wife and mistress/lover to live in the conjugal home or sleep together in the same room with the abuser; and.
 - ii. Acts causing or attempting to cause the victim to engage in any sexual activity by force, threat of force, physical or other harm, threat of physical or other harm or coercion.
 - c. Psychological Violence refers to acts or omissions causing or likely to cause mental or emotional suffering of the victim such as, but not limited to intimidations, harassment, stalking, damage to property, public ridicule or humiliation, repeated verbal abuse and mental infidelity. It includes causing or allowing the victim to witness the physical, sexual, or psychological abuse of a member of the family to which the victim belongs, or to witness pornography in any form or to witness abusive injury to pets or to unlawful or unwanted deprivation of the right to custody and/or visitation of common children.
 - d. Economic Abuse refers to acts that make or attempt to make a woman financially dependent which includes, but is not limited to, the following:
 - withdrawal of financial support or preventing the victim from engaging in any legitimate profession, occupation, business or activity, except in cases wherein the other spouse/partner objects on valid, serious, and moral grounds as defined in Article 73 of the Family Code;
 - deprivation or threat of deprivation of financial resources and the right to the use and enjoyment of the conjugal, community or property owned in common;
 - c. destroying household property; and,
 - d. controlling the victim's own money or properties or solely controlling the conjugal money or properties.
- 6.31 **Women's Economic Empowerment** the transformative process that helps women and girls move from limited power, voice, and choice at home and in the economy to having the skills, resources, and opportunities needed to compete equitably in markets as well as the agency to control and benefit from the economic gains.
- 6.32 Women Empowerment refers to the provision, availability, and accessibility of opportunities, services, and observance of human rights which enable women to actively participate and contribute to the political, economic, social, and cultural development of the nation as well as those which shall provide them equal access to ownership, management, and control of production, and of material and informational resources and benefits in the family, community, and society.
- 6.33 **Cyber pornography** is the prohibited or unlawful representation of the human body or human

sexual behavior with the goal of sexual arousal over a new medium called the Internet. It may also refer to obscene and indecent live shows or interactive methods through the computer, the Internet and other electronic devices.

6.34 Marginalize - refers to the act of treating a person or group as though they are insignificant by isolating and/or disempowering them. The term marginalized describes the person or group that is being treated insignificantly, pushed to the margins of society and rendered powerless.

CHAPTER 2 DEVELOPMENT AREAS AND GAD-RELATED INTERVENTIONS

ARTICLE I GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

SECTION 1. Statement of Policy. The Iloilo Provincial Government shall ensure that all persons regardless of sex and gender are valued, respected, and protected from all forms of gender-based violence and that they shall be accorded the necessary and appropriate programs, services, and interventions.

SECTION 2. Programs, Services and Interventions for Gender-Based Violence. The IPG through its GAD Focal Point System shall ensure and monitor availability and accessibility of immediate services and support programs that address and respond to gender-based violence such as, but not limited to, VAWC, TIP, Child Prostitution, Cyber pornography, and Sexual Harassment.

2.1 Establishment of Desks and Other Facilities

- Establishment and Operationalization of Iloilo Provincial Women and Children's Desk
- b. Re-Establishment and Operationalization of IPDCWC
- CODI for Sexual Harassment cases
- Establishment and Operationalization of Women and Children Protection Unit (WCPU) in Designated Hospitals Managed by the Iloilo Provincial Government
- Establishment of one stop shop for VAW under MHO

2.2 Technical Assistance and Monitoring

SECTION 3. Comprehensive Training for Service Providers

- 3.1 Medico-Legal Officers. All Medico-Legal practitioners assigned to the WCPU designated hospitals managed by the Iloilo Provincial Government shall undergo trainings and other capability-building activities that will ensure accurate and efficient Medico-Legal evaluations and certifications including but not limited to:
 - a. determining qualification and eligibility of requesting party;
 - b. proper documentation and use of Terminologies; and, c. standard procedure in issuing Medico-Legal Certificates.
- Registered Social Workers. All Registered Social Workers in the PSWDO shall undergo various 3.2 trainings such as, but not limited to, proper concepts and procedures of case management, forensics, psychosocial support, psychological first aid, and crisis intervention.

ARTICLE II **HEALTH AND NUTRITION**

Statement of Policy. The Iloilo Provincial Government shall ensure that all women and men, SECTION 4. regardless of their SOGIE-SC, have access to comprehensive, gender-responsive, culture-sensitive, and youthfriendly health services covering all stages of a life cycle that will help in the attainment of the full potential of a person, including those relating to maternal and child health care, paternal health, and sexual and reproductive health: Provided, due respect shall be accorded to the individuals' religious convictions in the provision of the comprehensive health care services, administering drugs, interventions, and other substances, implementing responsible parenthood programs, and planning for a family.

SECTION 5. Right to Reproductive Health. All men and women, regardless of sex and gender, and all couples shall be able to exercise their right to reproductive health. They shall be able to decide freely for themselves on matters related to the following, provided that the rights do not include abortion and access to abortifacients:

- 5.1 having a child or not;
- 5.2 number, spacing, and timing of their children;
- 5.3 making other decisions concerning reproduction free of discrimination, coercion, and violence;
- 5.4 accessing information and means to do so; and,
- 5.5 attaining the highest standard of sexual health and reproductive health.

SECTION 6. Comprehensive, Gender-Responsive, Culture-Sensitive and Youth-Friendly and Inclusive Reproductive Health Care Services. All women and men, regardless of their sex and gender, shall be able to access comprehensive, gender-responsive, culture-sensitive, and youth-friendly health care services that contribute to the reproductive health and well-being by addressing reproductive health-related problems, including sexual health, towards enhancement of one's life and personal relations. These reproductive health care services include:

- 6.1 Family planning information and services which shall include as a first priority making women of reproductive age fully aware of their respective cycles to make them aware of when fertilization is highly probable, as well as highly improbable;
- 6.2 Maternal, Newborn, and Child Health and Nutrition
 - a. Antenatal Care
 - b. Promotion of Breastfeeding
 - c. Delivery
 - d. Postpartum Care
 - e. newborn health services
 - f. immunization
 - g. micronutrient supplementation and food fortification
 - h. management of common childhood diseases
- 6.3 Prevention and proscription of abortion and management of pregnancy-related complications. In cases of violence against women and children, victim survivors shall be provided with comprehensive health services that include psychosocial, therapeutic, medical, and legal interventions and assistance towards healing, recovery, and empowerment;
- Responsible, ethical, legal, safe, and effective integrated family planning;
- 6.5 Family and State collaboration in youth sexuality education, youth reproductive health guidance and counseling, and adolescent health services without prejudice to the primary right and duty of parents to educate their children;
- 6.6 Prevention and management of RTIs, including HIV, AIDS, and other STIs;
- 6.7 Prevention and management of reproductive tract cancers among women and men, like breast, cervical, and prostate cancers, and other gynecological conditions and disorders;
- 6.8 Prevention, treatment, and management of infertility and sexual dysfunction pursuant to ethical norms and medical standards;
- 6.9 Provision of sexual and reproductive health care services for women and men with disabilities;
- 6.10 Provision of sexual and reproductive health care services for women and men who are deprived of liberty;
- 6.11 Care of the elderly women and men; and,
- 6.12 Management, treatment, and intervention of mental health problems of male and female children, youth, and other vulnerable individuals.

SECTION 7. Access of Children to Family Planning Services. The IPG shall ensure that any child or minor who consults at IPG-owned and managed health care facilities is given age-appropriate counseling on responsible parenthood and reproductive health. It shall require the following conditions in dispensing health products and performing procedures for family planning:

- 7.1 The minor presents written consent from a parent or guardian; or
- 7.2 The minor has had a previous pregnancy or is already a parent as proven by any one of the following circumstances, among others:
 - a. Written documentation from a skilled health professional;
 - a. Written documentation from a skilled health professional;b. Documentation through ancillary examinations such as ultrasound;
 - c. Written manifestation from a guardian, local social welfare and development officer, local government official or local health volunteer; or
 - d. Accompanied personally by a parent, grandparent, or guardian.

The consent shall not be required in the case of abused or exploited minors, where the parent or the person exercising parental authority is the respondent, accused, or convicted perpetrator as certified by the proper prosecutorial office or the court.

In the absence of any parent or legal guardian, written consent shall be obtained only for elective surgical procedures from the grandparents, and in their default, the oldest brother or sister who is at least 18 years of age or the relative who has the actual custody of the child, or authorized representatives of children's homes, orphanages, and similar institutions duly accredited by the proper government agency, among others. In no case shall consent be required in emergency or serious cases as defined in RA 8344.

In case a child satisfies any of the above conditions but is still refused access to information and/or services, complaints shall be directed to the designated Reproductive Health Officer (RHO) of the facility and shall be acted upon immediately.

SECTION 8. *Men in Reproductive Health.* All men, regardless of sexual orientation and gender identity, shall be provided by the Iloilo Provincial Government with venues to increase their level of awareness on their involvement, accountability, and responsibility in all areas of sexual health and reproductive health. They shall also have access to reproductive health services that will address concerns specific to males.

SECTION 9. The Provincial Health Review Team. The Provincial Health Review Team with at least seven (7) members, including the head of the Team, shall be responsible of conducting the annual MDR and FIDR or at shorter intervals subject to the discretion of the PHO and shall focus on identification of systemic gaps and ensure that these are addressed either by the LGU or by the DOH. It shall also formulate Gender-Responsive Provincial Maternal Death and Fetal and Infant Death Intervention Plan.

SECTION 10. *Gender Sensitive Health Care Programs and Services.* The IPG shall provide gender sensitive health care programs and services throughout the life cycle of women and men particularly those who belong to marginalized and vulnerable basic sectors:

- 10.1 women and men;
- 10.2 female and male farmer-peasant;
- 10.3 artisanal fisher folks;
- 10.4 workers both in the formal/informal sector and migrant workers including undocumented one;
- 10.5 PWUD;
- 10.6 victims of calamities and disaster;
- 10.7 youth and students;
- 10.8 boys and girls below 18 years old;
- 10.9 male and female beneficiaries of ECLIP-FR;
- 10.10 CICL in IPG-owned and managed facility;
- 10.11 PWD;
- 10.12 senior citizens, prioritizing centenarians and those who are totally bedridden;
- 10.13 members of the ICC/IPs;
- 10.14 female and male solo parents and their children;
- 10.15 members of the LGBTQIA community; and

10.16 indigent women and men, regardless of age.

SECTION 11. Access to Safe and Potable Water. The IPG shall ensure that families are able to access safe and potable water, prioritizing those in GIDAs, with a solo parent as head of the family, and those with members who are PWD and senior citizens.

SECTION 12. Access to Basic Sanitation Facilities. The Iloilo Provincial Government (IPG), through its ZOD TWG, shall ensure that each household has the access to basic sanitation facilities, prioritizing the indigent and those in GIDAs. The ZOD TWG shall also ensure that all public facilities in the province have functional gender sensitive sanitary toilets accessible to LGBTQ, PWD and Senior Citizens.

SECTION 13. *Healthy Lifestyle.* The IPG, as a strategy to improve health conditions of women, men, boys, girls, and youth, shall encourage and promote healthy lifestyle by implementing programs that foster physical activities, proper nutrition, and injury prevention.

SECTION 14. *Information, Education and Campaign*. In partnership and coordination with the City and Municipal Government Units, the IPG, through the PSWDO, PPO, and PHO, shall sustain a heightened multimedia campaign to raise the level of public awareness on the protection and promotion of responsible parenthood and reproductive health and rights including, but not limited to, maternal health and nutrition, family planning and responsible parenthood information and services, adolescent and youth reproductive health, guidance and counseling and other elements of reproductive health care.

SECTION 15. *Gender-Responsive Nutrition Program.* The IPG shall implement a comprehensive and gender-responsive nutrition program that will address prevailing food security and nutrition concerns faced by girls, boys, women, and men such as wasting, stunting, overweight and obesity, micronutrient deficiency, chronic energy deficiency and food insecurity. In developing the program, the IPG, through the Provincial Nutrition Council, shall consider targeting as a strategy for gender differentiation in identifying needs and interventions.

SECTION 16. Support to Health Care Service Providers. The IPG shall endeavor to conduct various activities in support to the development of health care service providers:

- 16.1 Mandatory Gender Sensitivity Training for all Health Care Service Providers of the Province
- 16.2 Training of Trainers on RPRH
- 16.3 Annual Financial Assistance for Barangay Health Workers (BHWs) and Barangay Nutrition Scholars (BNS)

ARTICLE III LABOR, EMPLOYMENT, AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITIES

SECTION 17. Statement of Policy. Recognizing that women and men, regardless of their SOGIESC, are major contributors to the local economic development, the Iloilo Provincial Government shall engage in socio-economic programs and projects that are inclusive and non-discriminatory to include youth, women, solo parents, persons with disabilities, members of the indigenous cultural communities or indigenous people, former rebels, persons who used drugs, persons who were previously deprived of liberty, LGBTQIA+, and other marginalized and vulnerable sectors as beneficiaries and partners. It shall also facilitate improvement of their access to micro, small, medium, and large-scale socio-economic opportunities.

The Iloilo Provincial Government shall also ensure that all forty-two (42) municipalities and one (1) component city in Iloilo Province provide inclusive and gender-responsive local economic and employment opportunities.

SECTION 18. *Equal Access to Job Trainings and Promotions.* No one shall be deprived nor denied the opportunity to access job trainings and promotion on account of sex, age, ethnicity, disability, civil status, creed, religious affiliation, income, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression as guaranteed by the Labor Code of the Philippines, as amended, and other national laws protecting women and other marginalized sectors.

SECTION 19. Establishment of a Provincial Workforce Database Comprising SADDD. The Iloilo Provincial Government shall promote transparency, inclusivity, and evidence-based decision-making in matters related to labor, employment, and economic opportunities through the creation of a comprehensive Provincial Workforce Database, which includes disaggregated data concerning sex, age, and disability status.

SECTION 20. *Employment Assistance Program.* The Iloilo Provincial Government shall establish employment assistance programs as a key initiative aimed at supporting individuals, particularly women, in accessing meaningful employment opportunities. These programs include, but are not limited to, the following components:

- 20.1 Job Training and Skills Development: Providing training programs and workshops that enhance the employability of program participants, with a focus on sectors with underrepresented groups;
- 20.2 Career Counseling and Guidance: Offering guidance on career planning, job search strategies,
- 20.3 Job Placement Services: Facilitating connections between job seekers and potential employers, including assistance with resume preparation and interview skills; and,
- 20.4 Entrepreneurship Support: Assisting individuals interested in entrepreneurship with business planning, access to capital, and relevant resources.

SECTION 21. *Employment and Economic Opportunities for Male and Female Out-of-School Youth.* The Iloilo Provincial Government recognizes the importance of addressing the unique needs and challenges faced by out-of-school youth within its jurisdiction. It shall ensure that employment and economic opportunities are accessible and available for male and female out-of-school youth. It shall also:

- 21.1 Promote and facilitate gender-responsive skills development and vocational training programs that address the needs and interests of male and female out-of-school youth.
- 21.2 Facilitate access to job placement services and employment opportunities through partnerships
- 21.3 Encourage and provide support for entrepreneurship initiatives and training programs that enable out-of-school youth to establish and manage their own businesses or microenterprises.
- Allocate funds to provide financial assistance or grants to eligible out-of-school youth to support their education, training, or entrepreneurial endeavors.

SECTION 22. Women's Economic Empowerment. The Iloilo Provincial Government shall develop and implement gender-responsive economic policies and programs to promote women's economic empowerment:

- 22.1 The IPG shall facilitate women's access to microfinance and credit facilities to support entrepreneurial endeavors and small businesses.
- 22.2 The IPG shall provide training, mentorship, and resources to encourage women's entrepreneurship and participation in the local economy.
- 22.3 The IPG shall create opportunities for women to access markets and trade their products or
- 22.4 The IPG shall promote gender equality in the workplace, including addressing workplace discrimination and gender-based harassment.

SECTION 23. *Employment and Economic Opportunities for Solo Parents.* The Iloilo Provincial Government shall recognize the unique challenges faced by solo parents and establish measures to promote their employment and economic well-being. It shall create a supportive environment that facilitates their economic independence and stability. It shall also:

- 23.1 Provide job matching and referral services to connect solo parents with suitable employment opportunities
- Offer skills development and training programs to enhance the employability of solo parents, with a focus on industries with high demand.
- Allocate funds to provide financial assistance or grants to eligible solo parents to support their education, skills training, or entrepreneurial endeavors.

23.4 Encourage and provide support for entrepreneurship initiatives and training programs that enable solo parents to establish and manage their own businesses or microenterprises.

SECTION 24. *Employment and Economic Opportunities for Persons with Disabilities.* The Iloilo Provincial Government shall promote equal employment and inclusive economic opportunities for PWDs within the province. It seeks to eliminate discrimination and barriers to their participation in the workforce and enhance their economic independence and well-being by:

- 24.1 Ensuring that male and female PWDs have access to job placement services to assist them in securing and maintaining employment. These services shall be designed to match skills and preferences of the PWD with suitable job opportunities.
- 24.2 Encouraging compliance of business owners and employers to RA 10524 which mandates that government agencies and private companies employing more than 100 employees should have at least 1% of their workforce composed of persons with disabilities (PWDs).
- 24.3 Encouraging employers to provide reasonable accommodations, such as workplace modifications, assistive technologies, or flexible work arrangements, to enable PWDs to perform their job duties effectively.
- 24.4 Providing skills development and vocational training programs, in partnership with relevant agencies and organizations, tailored to the specific needs and interests of PWDs, enhancing their employability and competitiveness in the job market.
- 24.5 Supporting and encouraging entrepreneurship among PWDs by providing training, mentorship, and financial resources to help them establish and manage their businesses or microenterprises.

SECTION 25. *Employment and Economic Opportunities for LGBTQIA.* The Iloilo Provincial Government shall uphold and promote equal employment opportunities regardless of the person's sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, and sex characteristics by ensuring that:

- 25.1 LGBTQIA+ have access to non-discriminatory job placement services and inclusive employment support programs designed to assist them in securing and maintaining employment.
- 25.2 Efforts are made to support and promote entrepreneurship among LGBTQIA individuals by providing trainings, mentorship, and financial resources to help them establish and manage their businesses or microenterprises.
- 25.3 In partnership with relevant agencies and LGBTQIA organizations, skills development and vocational training programs are responsive to the specific needs and interests of LGBTQIA individuals to enhance their employability and competitiveness in the job market.

SECTION 26. Other Employment and Economic Opportunities for the Members of ERPAT, Former Rebels, Persons Who Used Drugs, Persons Who Were Previously Deprived of Liberty. The IPG shall facilitate the reintegration of former rebels, persons who used drugs, and persons who were previously deprived of liberty into the workforce through support programs, job placement, and various skills training.

SECTION 27. Women in Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs). The Women's Economic Empowerment (WEE) Program shall ensure that Women in Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSMEs) are provided with improved access to various resources and opportunities such as but not limited to loan and capital assistance, packaging and labelling of products, capacity-building on entrepreneurship, trade fairs, and sector development activities. It shall also provide assistance to women who express interest to establish micro enterprise in the form of but not limited to the conduct of market feasibility studies, financial consultancy, and product development and patent application guides.

SECTION 28. *Right to Decent Work, Environment, Facilities, and Support System.* The IPG shall ensure that all women and men in the workforce shall enjoy decent work standards in all establishments or facilities where they are employed and assigned to. To attain the foregoing, the IPG shall encourage the Municipal LGUs and Passi City LGU to include the following requirements prior to the release and/or renewal of business permits:

- 28.1 Provision of support services and gears to protect women and men from occupational and health hazards such as but not limited to personal protective equipment to prevent injury or impairment of any part of their bodies;
- 28.2 Conduct of orientations and trainings on OSHS, medical surveillance and research, and screening tests for reproductive tract diseases;
- 28.3 Provision of services in support to balancing family obligations and work responsibilities, such as but not limited to the following: Day Care and Child-Minding Centers, Breastfeeding or lactation stations with appropriate facilities and corresponding nursing/lactation breaks, and flexible working hours, among others; and,
- 28.4 Presence of a gender-sensitive physical plan that includes, but is not limited to, the provision of separate facilities for women and men such as lavatories, dressing rooms, and other similar facilities, the purpose of which is to ensure a safe space for all the male and female workers.

SECTION 29. Wage and Benefits. Every employer shall comply with the Minimum Wage Law as stipulated by the Regional Wage Board or passed by the Congress and shall grant all benefits to all male and female employees such as sick and vacation leave, retirement, termination, maternity leave, and other benefits mandated by law including the Magna Carta of Women, Expanded Maternity Leave Law, and Expanded Solo Parents Welfare Act, provided that the employees shall have met the qualifications required. Special leave benefits shall include:

- 29.1 Special Leave Benefits for Women Workers with Surgery due to Gynecological Disorder. In compliance to the Magna Carta of Women, the lloilo Provincial Government shall ensure that any female employee in the public, regardless of age and civil status who undergoes surgery due to gynecological disorders shall be entitled to a special leave of two (2) months with full pay based on her gross monthly compensation subject to existing laws, rules, and regulations.
- 29.2 **Special Leave Benefits for Women in Postpartum Period.** Women workers in Iloilo Province with children 0-6 months old shall be entitled to a 30-day leave without pay to be availed of within the first six (6) months from child delivery; provided that if the employer is already granting similar benefits over and above what the existing laws require, such benefits shall be credited as compliance therewith. The Special Leave Benefits for Women in Postpartum Period may be availed for the following, but not limited to these, purposes:
 - 29.1.a breastfeeding;
 - 29.1.a breastreeding,
 29.1.b management of changing family dynamics;
 - 29.1.c obtain postpartum physical health and well-being;29.2.d provide appropriate and necessary child care; and,
 - 29.3.e treatment of postpartum conditions.
- 29.3 Special Leave Benefits for Solo Parent Workers. All privileges under existing laws shall be granted to any solo parent employee in the Province of Iloilo. The parental leave benefit may be availed of by the solo parent employees in the government and the private sector.

SECTION 30. Social Security for Female and Male Workers and Employees. The IPG shall encourage the LGUs of forty-two (42) municipalities and Passi City to monitor compliance of business owners and other entrepreneurs to RA 11199, otherwise known as the "Social Security Act of 2018".

SECTION 31. *Orientation on Safe Spaces Act and Ordinance.* Male and female employees of the Iloilo Provincial Government, including those assigned in communities, hospitals, and other facilities shall be oriented on Safe Spaces Act and Safe Spaces Ordinance of Iloilo Province.

Likewise, all city and municipal LGUs in Iloilo Province are encouraged to conduct the same for its employees. It shall also cover privately-owned establishments operating within its territorial jurisdiction. This shall form part of the City and Municipal 3-Year GAD Monitoring and Evaluation Report.

SECTION 32. Protection and Welfare of Male and Female Domestic Workers. The Iloilo Provincial Government shall encourage employers to register all domestic workers under their employment in the Local Registry of Domestic Workers in the barangay where the employer's residence is located. It shall likewise assist in the monitoring of compliance to RA 10361, otherwise known as the "Batas Kasambahay."

SECTION 33. *Spousal Support.* Spousal support is required by law to provide the needs of women and children and all agreements or settlements relative thereto shall be final and executory. Any modification of the agreement or settlement shall be allowed only if they are advantageous to the children.

ARTICLE IV GENDER AND MIGRATION

SECTION 34. *Statement of Policy.* The Iloilo Provincial Government recognizes that migration significantly impacts individuals, families, and communities, and that migration and gender are interconnected phenomena. The IPG shall commit to promoting the rights, safety, and well-being of migrant women and men, regardless of SOGIE-SC, as well as addressing the specific gender-related challenges and opportunities associated with migration.

SECTION 35. *Protection and Welfare of Migrant Workers and Their Families.* The welfare of male and female migrant workers, their families, and Overseas Filipinos in distress shall be protected and promoted by the IPG by ensuring that:

- 35.1 Male and female migrant workers receive a comprehensive pre-departure orientation that includes information about their rights, duties, protections, gender-specific risks, and available resources and services under domestic and international laws and regulations;
- 35.2 Male and female migrant workers are protected from illegal or unethical recruitment practices;
- 35.3 The Province establishes programs that provide support to the families left behind by migrant workers, including psychosocial services, access to education and healthcare, and economic opportunities:
- Families of migrant workers receive financial education and literacy trainings to properly and sustainably manage remittances;
- 35.5 Returning migrant workers have access to reintegration services, including skills development, livelihood assistance, and psychosocial support to facilitate their reintegration into the local community and workforce;
- 35.6 Returning distressed male and female migrant workers have access to financial aid and credit assistance; and,
- 35.7 The National Migrant Workers' Day is annually celebrated every June 7, the National Seafarer's Day every last Sunday of September, and the World Migrants Day every December 18.

SECTION 36. Women and Migration. The IPG shall promote gender equality, protect the rights of migrant women, and enhance their well-being throughout the migration process. It shall ensure that:

- 36.1 Migrant women have access to reproductive health services, including family planning, maternal health care, and information about sexually transmitted infections, irrespective of their migration status;
- 36.2 Specialized mental health support and counseling services are available to address the psychosocial needs of migrant women, particularly those facing separation from their families.
- Programs are established to provide comprehensive support to the families left behind by migrant women, including childcare, educational support, healthcare access, and economic opportunities;
- Migrant women have access to skills development and vocational training programs tailored to enhance their employability and income-generating capabilities; and,
- 36.5 Support is provided to migrant women who wish to establish and manage their own businesses or microenterprises upon their return.

SECTION 37. *Maintenance of Sex, Age, and Disability Disaggregated Data on Migrant Workers.* The Migrant Workers Data shall be integrated in the Provincial Workforce Database, which includes disaggregated data concerning sex, age, and disability.

SECTION 38. Tracking System of Legitimacy of Recruitment Agency or Employment. The Iloilo Provincial Government shall coordinate closely with the Department of Migrant Workers to allow individuals, jobseekers, and concerned parties to verify the legitimacy of recruitment agencies and the authenticity of job offers.

SECTION 39. *Programs and Services for Male and Female Migrant Workers.* The IPG shall ensure the accessibility of the following programs and services to male and female migrant workers:

- Pre-employment Orientation Seminar. Male and female migrant workers shall be oriented on their rights, responsibilities, and potential challenges that they may face during their employment abroad. It shall cover topics such as legal protections, cultural sensitivity, financial management, and safety precautions, to ensure preparedness among migrant workers for their overseas employment experience and prevention of potential risks and exploitation.
- Financial Literacy Program. This program shall increase awareness and literacy of male and female migrant workers on budgeting, saving, investment basics, remittance management, and protection against financial exploitation. It shall empower migrant workers with the financial knowledge needed to make informed decisions, achieve financial stability, and secure a brighter future for themselves and their families back home.
- 39.3 **Reintegration Program.** Services such as skills training, job placement assistance, psychosocial support, and access to healthcare to facilitate a smooth reintegration process shall be made available for and accessible by returning OFWs. It shall help them successfully reintegrate into their local communities, find meaningful employment, and rebuild their lives after their overseas work experience.
- 39.4 **Organization of OFWs.** The forming of OFW Organization is a collective effort that shall bring together migrant workers and their families. It shall serve as a platform for migrant workers, their families, and community to connect, share experiences, and advocate for their rights and interests. It shall offer valuable resources, including information, guidance, and solidarity, to help migrant workers navigate the challenges of working abroad while fostering a sense of unity among those living away from home.
- 39.5 **Financial Assistance to Repatriated OFWs.** Repatriated and distressed male and female OFWs shall be able to access financial assistance to facilitate their social protection and financial recovery.
- 39.6 **Repatriation Request Referral.** Male and female OFWs who express intention to return to the Philippines during crisis or emergency situations shall be referred to appropriate agencies and organizations that provide services related to repatriation to ensure their well-being.

ARTICLE V EDUCATION AND TRAINING

SECTION 40. *Statement of Policy.* The IPG, through the PSB and the EdCore, shall endeavor to improve availability and access of girls, boys, women and men to inclusive, affordable, non-discriminatory, and gender-responsive education. It shall also endeavor to improve women's and men's access to non-traditional and technology-based education and training programs. It shall also provide support for Alternative Learning System implemented by DepEd when necessary.

SECTION 41. *Gender-Responsive Education.* The IPG shall assist the Department of Education in implementing and monitoring Gender-Responsive Basic Education as provided in DepEd Order No. 32, series of 2017. Likewise, it shall also coordinate with the CHED in ensuring provision of gender-responsive education at the tertiary level.

The IPG shall foster respect for gender differences as part of the learner's identity, promote gender parity as one of the strategies to advance gender equity, evolve to close gaps and eradicate gender-based discrimination, enable gender-sensitive education structure, systems, and methodologies, and address gender-based barriers.

SECTION 42. *Gender-Responsive Educational Materials.* In partnership with the Department of Education, the IPG shall ensure that educational and other learning materials distributed to learners and those available in schools do not portray gender stereotype images nor contain gender-discriminatory language.

SECTION 43. *Gender-Responsive Curricula.* The IPG, through the Provincial School Board, shall ensure that the curricula in all schools at all levels operating in Iloilo province promote complementary roles between women and men and provide gender sensitivity orientation. It shall also encourage private schools and other educational institutions to do the same.

SECTION 44. *Gender-Responsive Education and Facilities for Learners With Special Needs.* The right to quality education at all levels is one of the basic rights of every Filipino including persons with disabilities. Any interested person with disabilities shall not be deprived of this basic right. The IPG shall ensure that gender-responsive education for male and female learners with special needs is available and accessible.

Through the EdCore Iloilo, the IPG shall also monitor the gender-responsiveness and compliance of education facilities to the standards for learners with disability and special needs provided in the Accessibility Law and RA 7277 or the "Magna Carta for Persons with Disabilities," as amended by RA 9442.

SECTION 45. Scholarships and Educational Assistance. The IPG shall sustain the implementation and facilitate the institutionalization of scholarships programs that will benefit the marginalized and vulnerable male and female learners such as but not limited to:

- 45.1 Iskolar Sang Iloilo Program (ISIP);
- 45.2 Educational Assistance Program for PWD;
- 45.3 Educational Assistance for Members of ICC/IP;
- 45.4 Scholarship Program in the Province of Iloilo for the Children of Overseas Filipino Workers (OFWs) who are in crisis situation; and,
- 45.5 Top Ten (10) Highest Places in the Board Examination, Bar Examination, and Other National Licensure Examinations.

It shall also seek to consider other vulnerable and marginalized learners by implementing additional scholarship or educational assistance programs such as:

- 45.6 Educational Assistance for Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program Beneficiaries who are 18 years old or above;
- 45.7 Educational Assistance for Children of Solo Parents;
- 45.8 Educational Assistance for Children of CLIP-FR Beneficiaries; and.
- 45.9 Educational Assistance for Qualified and Eligible PWUD who have completed the after-care services and ready for re-integration.

It shall also ensure that scholarships and educational assistance program guidelines are not discriminatory and shall not disqualify scholars who are married, those with children, nor pregnant learners. Disqualification or termination of the scholarship or educational assistance shall be based on merits, school performance, and compliance to guidelines, not on the basis of SOGIESC, age, disability, religion or intersectionality.

SECTION 46. *Establishment of Teen Centers.* The IPG shall continue to establish Teen Centers that will serve as venue for the implementation of the AHYDP and the PRIME. It shall also monitor the conduct of career guidance and counseling among the youth and adolescent learners.

SECTION 47. *Child Protection Policy in Schools.* Public and private elementary and secondary schools operating in Iloilo Province are enjoined to comply with their mandate as stipulated in DepEd Order No. 40, series of 2012, prioritizing the following:

- 47.1 Organizing their respective Child Protection Committee;
- 47.2 Crafting the School's Child Protection Policy taking into consideration children with special needs, victim-survivors of abuse, and marginalized; and,
- 47.3 Capacity-building of school officials, personnel, parents, and students on Anti-Bullying, Positive Discipline, Special Protection of Children Against Abuse, Exploitation, and Discrimination, Anti-Rape, and other GBV.

The Iloilo PCPC shall monitor GBV cases reported to school authorities and shall provide needed interventions

SECTION 48. Gender Responsive Utilization of Special Education Fund. Ensuring gender-responsiveness in the utilization of the SEF by the Provincial School Board, the following can be funded provided that the HGDG is observed:

- 48.1 Operation and maintenance of public schools;
- 48.2 Construction and repair of school buildings;
- 48.3 Facilities and equipment;
- 48.4 Educational research;
- 48.5 Purchase of books and periodicals;
- 48.6 Sports development; and,
- 48.7 Funding for the ECCD program, particularly for the following purposes:
 - Direct services related to the implementation of the ECCD program, such as salaries/allowances
 of locally-hired Child Development Teachers and/or Day Care Workers, etc.;
 - Organization and support of parent cooperatives to establish community-based ECCD programs;
 - c. Provision of counterpart funds for the continuing professional development of ECCD public
 - service providers;
 d. Provision of facilities for the conduct of the ECCD Program; and,
 - e. Payment of expenses pertaining to the operations of National Child Development Centers, including, but not limited to, utilities (i.e. electricity and water expenses) and communication (i.e. telephone expenses).

SECTION 49. Capacity-Building Program on GAD for the Human Resources of Educational Institutions. Private and public elementary and secondary schools shall be encouraged to regularly and continuously conduct capacity-building activities for school officials, teachers, non-teaching personnel, and other human resources.

ARTICLE VI MARRIAGE AND FAMILY RELATIONS

SECTION 50. *Statement of Policy.* The IPG recognizes that marriage is a special contract of permanent union between a man and a woman entered into in accordance with law for the establishment of conjugal and family life. It further recognizes that parents have parental responsibilities and the duty to protect their children's rights. As such, it shall protect and strengthen marriage and family relations in the Province of Iloilo. It shall also protect the interest of children and to shield them from dangerous or predatory situations arising from unhealthy family relations.

SECTION 51. *Gender Sensitive Pre-Marriage Orientation and Counselling.* The IPG shall adopt the PMOC Program of the Commission on Population and Development. The pre-marriage and counselling sessions in Iloilo Province shall be made gender-sensitive through integration of gender perspective in modules and materials. The IPG shall ensure the use of gender-fair language in the localized manual and in the actual conduct of the pre-marriage and counselling sessions.

Pursuant to the adoption of the PMOC Program, the IPG shall strengthen the existing PMOC-TWG for effective implementation of the program.

SECTION 52. *Parental Responsibilities.* The father and the mother shall jointly exercise parental authority and responsibility over the persons of their unemancipated children.

Pursuant to Provincial Ordinance No. 2017-144, otherwise known as the "Iloilo Province Code of Parental Responsibility (CPR) 2017," the IPG shall create the CPR Technical Working Group to be chaired by the PSWDO. IPG to lead its implementation. The TWG shall encourage City/Municipal LGUs to establish and implement the PES Program aimed at strengthening parental involvement in their children's development and learning.

The Pantawid Pamilyang Pilipino Program beneficiaries, particularly the parents, shall be enjoined to participate in the Family Development Sessions conducted by the DSWD through the Municipal Links to become more responsive

to the health and education need of the family and their children and to enable them in becoming socially aware and involved in community development activities.

ARTICLE VII GENDER IN AGRICULTURE AND FISHERIES

SECTION 53. *Statement of Policy.* The Iloilo Provincial Government recognizes that both men and women farmers and fisher folks shall enjoy equal treatment in the agriculture and fishery sector. It shall encourage participation of women in agriculture and fishery sector and shall be involved in all stages of the project. It shall ensure that women farmers have improved access to basic services and facilities relative to agriculture and fishery services such as, but not limited to, demonstration farms, aquaculture, and marine products.

SECTION 54. Provision of Support to the Vulnerable Industry Practitioners in Agriculture and Fisheries. The IPG shall provide resources for agriculture-based and fishery-based interventions and programs that are intentionally designed for men and women, persons with disabilities, and other vulnerable practitioners in the industry. It shall improve access of marginalized individuals in this sector to capability-building programs that introduce latest agricultural and fisheries technologies for production, post-harvest, processing, promotion, marketing, among others. These capability-programs shall help them establish their local climate change adaptation strategies, and minimize risks and losses brought about by various natural or human-induced phenomena or occurrences. It shall also ensure that equipment, facilities, and technologies introduced are gender-sensitive.

SECTION 55. Organizing and Provision of Assistance to Groups and Cooperatives for Women in These Sectors. Women in agriculture and fishery shall be encouraged to and assisted in organizing their respective groups and cooperatives. The IPG, through the Provincial Agriculture Office, shall assist the LGUs in Iloilo Province in organizing the RIC. It shall also organize the RIC at the provincial level. It shall also encourage women farmers and women in fisheries to organize their cooperatives in order for them to maintain or increase market access, reduce risk, improve production or yield, and generate more sales and to improve their access to pricing and marketing opportunities

SECTION 56. Credit Programs or Facilities for Men and Women in Agriculture and Fisheries. Rural men and women, including male and female with disabilities shall have access to government and private sector programs that grant agricultural credit, loans, and non-material resources and shall enjoy equal treatment in agrarian reform and resettlement programs.

ARTICLE VIII GENDER IN INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT

SECTION 57. *Statement of Policy.* The lloilo Provincial Government shall require infrastructure projects that cater to the needs of children, women, senior citizens, persons with disabilities and with special needs, and other marginalized and vulnerable sectors.

SECTION 58. *Gender-Responsive Infrastructure Development.* The IPG, through Provincial GFPS, shall require assessment of the infrastructure projects in the different stages of its project cycle using the HGDG to measure its gender-responsiveness.

The infrastructure projects shall foster gender-responsive development that will result to the following:

- 58.1 Improved access of women and children to sources of water;
- 58.2 Improved women's participation and decision-making in planning, project design, implementation, monitoring, evaluation, and maintenance of public services and facilities:
- 58.3 Improved access of women to employment opportunities in infrastructure and other non-traditional occupations;
- Improved access of women, children, and all vulnerable and marginalized individuals to public transport services and other infrastructure development; and,
- 58.5 Basic services and facilities due to the construction or concreting of farm to market roads.

SECTION 59. *Basic Physical Planning Requirements.* In compliance to the Batas Pambansa Bilang 344, otherwise known as the "Accessibility Law," the IPG shall ensure that all the buildings and facilities that it owns and manages, all its road and other infrastructure projects promote the enhancement of mobility of male and female PWDs. It shall also advocate for, encourage, and monitor private buildings and related structure to comply with the said Act.

SECTION 60. *Monitoring of Infrastructure and Other Related Facilities.* The IPG, through the Provincial Engineering Office, shall monitor compliance to the Accessibility Law and gender-responsiveness of IPG infrastructure and other related facilities as required by the MCW.

ARTICLE IX GENDER, MEDIA, AND ENTERTAINMENT

SECTION 61. *Statement of Policy.* The Iloilo Provincial Government recognizes the dignity, roles, and contributions of women, men, girls, boys, and other vulnerable sectors in the family and community through the strategic use of media. It shall ensure and promote inclusive advancement and development through other various famous platforms by strictly adhering to the Code of Ethics for Media Practitioners and to PCW MC No. 48, series of 2013, "Adopting to the Gender Equality Guidelines in the Development of Media Policies and Implementing Programs to Promote Gender Mainstreaming." It shall also ensure that portrayal of women, men, girls, boys and other vulnerable sectors are non-derogatory and non-discriminatory.

SECTION 62. *Gender-Sensitive Production of Media Content.* It shall be the responsibility and accountability of every media practitioner to ensure that media contents being produced are gender-sensitive. Media outlets in the Province of Iloilo such as print, television, broadcast, film, radio and others, shall follow established guidelines set by the law, ordinances and other promulgations and issuances of the government to prevent airing, circulation, and exhibition/showing of stereotype marketing and promotional materials which are discriminatory, demeaning, and derogatory portrayal in media. They shall undergo GST, orientation on Data Privacy Act, and other pertinent laws, and shall be able to protect the rights of women and children especially during coverage and interviews. The IPG shall act on any complaints or reports received in accordance with the law.

The IPG shall encourage and influence academic institutions to inculcate responsibility, gender fairness and sensitivity among students who are into journalism, information technology, and other fields that are engaged in any content production.

SECTION 63. *Pornography.* It shall be unlawful for any person to print, publish, display or distribute copies of shows or motion pictures, posters, billboards, literary and other visual materials that treat any individual, including women and children, as sex objects or commodities. Violators shall be dealt with in accordance with the law.

SECTION 64. *Indecent shows.* It shall be considered a violation of human rights to force or deceive a woman or to induce, persuade, deceive or force a girl or boy child to dance, sing, act, or perform in public or private places for commercial or entertainment purposes. Persons, entities, establishments, or organizations engaging in such shows, public or private, shall be penalized in accordance with the law.

ARTICLE X GENDER AND CULTURE

SECTION 65. Statement of Policy. The Iloilo Provincial Government realizes that sociocultural realities in the communities affect both women and men. It shall therefore, respect and protect women and men, regardless of their SOGIESC. in enjoying their cultural rights.

SECTION 66. Preservation and Promotion of Culture, Ethnicity and Gender-Sensitive Local Practices. The IPG shall implement programs and projects that preserve and promote local culture, arts, crafts, and artisans. It shall likewise preserve, develop, and promote the positive local cultural practices, traditions, ethnicity, and arts, inclusive of those practiced by the Indigenous People, the Muslim population, and other existing ethnic and cultural groups in Iloilo Province.

ARTICLE XI GENDER AND SPORTS

SECTION 67. Statement of Policy. The IPG, through the ISDMO, shall endeavor to improve access of women and men of all ages to gender-sensitive and non-discriminatory competitive and non-competitive sports and physical development programs as means to achieve excellence, promote physical and social well-being, eliminate gender stereotyping, and provide equal access to the full benefits of development. It shall also foster interest in traditional and indigenous sports in male and female youth and children.

SECTION 68. Sports Development Program for Persons With Disabilities. The IPG, through its PDAO and in coordination with the ISDMO, shall develop and implement a sports development program for male and female persons with disabilities and shall endeavor to:

- 68.1 Train more male and female coaches in handling athletes with disabilities;
- 68.2 Conduct PWD-friendly and appropriate sports activities;
- 68.3 Provide equal opportunities for male and female athletes with disabilities for scholarships and travel grants with adequate support mechanism;
- 68.4 Ensure equal footing of male and female athletes with disabilities in terms of incentives and awards for competitions:
- 68.5 Allocate sufficient funds to support male and female athletes with disabilities; and,
- Establish support group by organizing athletes with disabilities. 68.6

ARTICLE XII GENDER MAINSTREAMING IN DISASTER RISK REDUCTION AND EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

SECTION 69. Statement of Policy. Women, children, youth, senior citizens, persons with disabilities and with special needs, and other vulnerable and marginalized male and female members of the community regardless of their sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, have the right to protection and security in times of disasters in all phases of relief, recovery, rehabilitation and reconstruction efforts. They shall also be involved during the preparatory and prepositioning activities particularly those that include decision-making. They shall also be fully-protected from sexual exploitation, trafficking in persons, sexual harassment, and other gender-based violence committed against

SECTION 70. Gender-Responsive Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Mechanisms. The IPG shall ensure gender responsiveness of the following mechanisms:

70.1 PDRRMC through the following functions and responsibilities:

- Approve, monitor and evaluate the inclusive implementation of the Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Plan (PDRRMP) and regularly review and test the plan consistent with other national and local planning programs;
- Ensure integration of gender-responsive disaster risk reduction and climate change adaptation into local development plans, programs and budgets as a strategy in sustainable development and poverty reduction; and,
- Recommend the implementation of forced or preemptive gender-sensitive evacuation of local residents, if necessary, taking into consideration their vulnerabilities.

70.2 PDRRM through the following functions and responsibilities:

- Design, program, and coordinate inclusive disaster risk reduction and management activities consistent with the National Council's standards and guidelines;
- Facilitate and support gender-sensitive risk assessments and contingency planning activities at the local level;
- Consolidate local disaster risk data and information that are sex, age, and disability disaggregated;
- Organize and conduct training, orientation, and knowledge management activities on gender-responsive disaster risk reduction and management at the local level;
- Formulate and implement a comprehensive, integrated and gender-responsive PDRRMP in accordance with the national, regional and provincial framework, and policies on disaster risk reduction in close coordination with the Provincial Development Council (PDC):
- Prepare and submit Annual PDRRMO GAD Plan and Budget to the Provincial GAD Unit;
- Conduct continuous disaster monitoring and mobilize instrumentalities and entities of the LGUs, CSOs, private groups and organized volunteers, to utilize their facilities and resources for the protection and preservation of life and properties during emergencies in accordance with existing policies and procedures;
- Identify, assess and manage the hazards, vulnerabilities, risks including gender-based violence in emergency situations that may occur in their locality;
- Disseminate information and raise public awareness about those hazards, vulnerabilities and risks, their nature, effects, early warning signs and counter-measures;
- Identify and implement cost-effective and risk reduction measures/strategies that are accessible by women and other vulnerable sectors:
- Maintain a database of human resource, equipment, directories, and location of critical infrastructures and their capacities such as hospitals and evacuation centers, including those that shall cater to any gender-based violence that may occur during emergencies;
- Develop, strengthen and operationalize mechanisms for partnership or networking with the private sector, CSOs, and volunteer groups including women's organizations;
- Take all necessary steps on a continuing basis to maintain, provide, or arrange the provision of, or to otherwise make available, suitably-trained and competent personnel for effective civil defense and gender-responsive disaster risk reduction and management in its area;
- Organize, train, equip and supervise the provincial emergency response teams and the Accredited Community Disaster Volunteers (ACDVs), ensuring that humanitarian aid workers are equipped with basic skills to assist mothers to breastfeed;
- Respond to and manage the adverse effects of emergencies and carry out recovery activities in the affected area, ensuring that there is an efficient mechanism for immediate delivery of food, shelter and medical supplies for women and children, endeavor to create a special place where internally-displaced mothers can find help with breastfeeding, feed and care for their babies and give support to each other;
- legislative provisions relevant to the purpose of this Act, and other laws such as, but not limited to, RA 7160, RA 9262, RA11313, and RA 10364;
- Recommend through the PDRRMC the enactment of gender-sensitive local ordinances consistent with the requirements of this Act;
- Strengthen and capacitate the ProCiD Serve Iloilo on gender-sensitivity; and,
- Prepare and submit PDRRMO GAD Accomplishment Report to the Iloilo PGAD Unit.

SECTION 71. Capacity-Building of Emergency Responders. The IPG, in partnership with the City and Municipal LGUs, shall build the capacity of community emergency response managers and first responders to be able to prevent and respond to Gender-Based Violence in all aspects of DRRM.

SECTION 72. Provision of Relief Assistance. The IPG shall ensure timely, adequate and culturally-appropriate relief assistance and services such as food, water, sanitary packs, PFA and PSS. Other assistance such as livelihood and education shall also be provided when necessary. It shall also ensure accessibility of comprehensive health services including the implementation of the MISP for SRH at the early stage of crisis.

SECTION 73. Women and Child-Friendly and Safe Evacuation Centers and Relocation Sites. The IPG shall provide technical support and resource augmentation to LGUs to ensure adoption of measures by camp managers to prevent gender-based violence in evacuation centers and relocation sites. It shall also monitor the designs of the evacuation centers to be safe for women and children experiencing violence and are comfortable spaces for babies and mothers. Referral services for mental health, family violence, and any gender-based violence. Emergency birth shall also be considered in determining resources and support that shall be made available in case of an unexpected

SECTION 74. Women's Involvement in Camp Management. Camp managers shall ensure that women have active participation in various camp committees responsible for food and water distribution, nutrition, sanitation, and hygiene, shelter, education, protection, security and safety especially in the decision-making process.

ARTICLE XIII GENDER AND LIBERTY

SECTION 75. Statement of Policy. The IPG shall respect the rights of all women and men who are deprived of liberty and are detained in the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP) in Nanga, Pototan

SECTION 76. Assistance to Male and Female Persons Deprived of Liberty. The IPG shall provide assistance for the male and female persons deprived of liberty detained in the Iloilo Rehabilitation Center giving priority to their health and nutrition status and other conditions including testing for sexually transmitted infections whether curable or

incurable. It shall also consider assistance requested by the BJMP that will help in closing the gender gaps and GBV inside the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP).

SECTION 77. Mental Health of Persons Deprived of Liberty. The IPG shall also endeavor to promote mental health among male and female persons deprived of liberty who are detained in the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP).

ARTICLE XIV GENDER AND TRANSPORTATION

SECTION 78. Statement of Policy. The IPG recognizes the following rights of male and female commuters:

- Right to Safety. Commuters have the right to expect safe and reliable transportation services; 78.1
- Right to Information. Commuters have the right to be informed of the fare rates, routes, and 78.2 schedules of transportation services; and,
- Right to be Treated Fairly. Commuters have the right to be treated with respect and fairness by 78.3 drivers and operators.

SECTION 79. Inclusive Formulation of Local Public Transport Route Plan. The IPG shall ensure participation and consider the needs of women, senior citizens, persons with disabilities, children, and other vulnerable commuters and stakeholders in planning, designing, and implementing the Provincial Public Transport Route Plan.

Further, the IPG shall provide technical assistance to the C/MLGU in developing route-oriented and gender-

SECTION 80. Public Transport Vehicles as Safe Spaces for All. The IPG shall endeavor to increase people's awareness on their right to safe spaces in public transport vehicles. It shall develop IEC materials that can be accessed by the commuters while on the vehicle or while queueing or waiting in a transportation hub. Discrimination and harassment in any form shall not be permitted.

It shall further endeavor to also increase awareness of drivers and operators on their obligations in ensuring that the transport vehicles foster positive and gender-sensitive transportation experience among commuters and promote a culture of inclusivity and equality.

ARTICLE XV GENDER IN POLITICAL AND PUBLIC SPHERE

SECTION 81. Statement of Policy. The IPG shall ensure the fundamental equality of every person and afford them their rights, privileges and opportunities as enshrined in the Constitution and other applicable laws.

SECTION 82. Human Resources in Local Government Units. Discrimination against and denying of entry to government service, participation in trainings and promotion, remuneration, and availing any benefits and privileges on the basis of one's SOGIE-SC shall be deemed unlawful. The IPG shall not deny the male and female employees of favorable opportunities which afford one's career or professional advancement.

SECTION 83. Inclusive and Participatory Development Planning and Implementation. The IPG shall ensure that the provincial plans and programs are inclusive and are developed and formulated in a participatory manner that involve women, men, persons with disabilities, senior citizens, and other CSOs, POs, and NGOs that cater to the needs of the marginalized and vulnerable sectors.

- It shall endeavor to organize, strengthen, accredit, and include as members of the 83.1 Provincial Development Council, at least, the following organizations:
 - KALIPI a.
 - RIC b.
 - PYAP C. 4H Club d.
 - ERPAT f. PCDA
 - Group of Persons with Diverse SOGIE g.
 - PWD
 - Solo Parents
 - Senior Citizens
 - Teen Center Peer Helpers
- 83.2 The IPG shall also organize the Provincial Council of Women with the following functions:
 - Coordinate and consolidate efforts of the municipal/city local councils of women concerning women agenda;
 - Work for the integration of the PFLCW, Inc. advocacy agenda and other relevant concerns in the provincial development plans and programs;
 - Conduct meetings as the need arises; and,
 - Coordinate, collaborate, recommend, and provide the necessary support to the NCRFW and PFLCW in the implementation of its programs.

SECTION 84. Equal Treatment Before the Law. Women and men have equal right to take an active part in the affairs of the IPG. Both have the right to participate in the formulation and implementation of local policies, thereof, to hold public office and perform mandated functions. Autonomy and improvement of political status of women, men, and other marginalized and vulnerable sectors are essential to the achievement of a participatory, just, transparent, and accountable local governance, administration and sustainable development.

- Families in Iloilo Province. The IPG recognizes that Ilonggo families are the foundations of the Iloilo Province. It also recognizes that Ilonggo families are not just limited to nuclear families but also include those families with a solo parent, and extended families having a relative or take on the responsibility as parents of the child or children to strengthen llonggo family solidarity and actively promote its total development by holding at least the following observances or celebrations and conduct activities relevant to:
 - Family Week every last week of September
 - International Day of Families every 15th of May
- 84.2 Solo Parents. The IPG recognizes that solo parents have the natural and primary rights and duty in rearing their children by providing for their basic needs. Towards this end, the IPG shall ensure protection of the rights of solo parents and shall provide them with access to social services and welfare benefits to uplift their status and circumstances. To realize these, the IPG shall:
 - Organize the Provincial Solo Parents Association
 - Establish the Provincial Solo Parents Registration System
 - Ensure participation of Solo Parents in Local Governance Celebrate the Solo Parents' Week every 3rd week of April of each year
- 84.3 Senior Citizens. The IPG shall endeavor to make essential goods, health and other social services available and accessible to all the people at affordable cost giving priority to the underprivileged, sick, senior citizens, persons with disability, women and children. Further, the IPG declares that it is the duty of the family to take care of its elderly members while the former continues to provide services and implement programs for their social protection.

Senior citizens, who actively contribute to productive and reproductive work, shall have continuous access to support service. The rights and privileges of senior citizens shall also be recognized by observing these activities:

- Elderly Filipino Week every 1st week of October;
- Search for the Most Senior Citizen-Friendly LGU to influence the city and municipal LGUs in adhering to laws pertinent to the protection of the senior citizens; and,
- the provision of cash incentives for centenarians, nonagenarians, and the octogenarians to augment for their basic needs, maintenance medicines and check up, and recreational
- 84.4 Women and Children. The IPG shall adopt declarations of the United Nations and other international organizations wherein the Philippines is a member nation. There shall be various activities that leads to gender equality and equity among all individuals in the Province, including

- - Women's Month every March;
 - International Women's Day every March 8; Women with Disabilities Day every last Monday of March of every year;
 - Women-Led Province-Wide Limpyo Iloilo;
 - Search for Huwarang Ilongga sang Probinsya;
 - Observance of 18-Day Campaign to End VAW annually from November 25 to December 12:
 - Breastfeeding Awareness Month every August of each year;
 - Breast Cancer Awareness Month every October of each year;
 - Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month every September of each year; National Rural Women's Day every 15th of October of each year;
 - Mothers' Day every 2nd Friday of May;
 - Provincial Self-Organization of Women
 - Kalipunan ng Liping Pilipina (KALIPI) Nasyonal through the PSWDO;
 - Rural Improvement Club (RIC) through the PAO;
 - Women MSMEs through LEDIP; and iii.
 - Local Council of Women:
 - Development of Public-Private Partnership with NGOs/CSOs focused on Women;
 - "Buwan ng mga Bata" every November of each year pursuant to RA 10661; and.
 - International Day of Women and Girls in Science every 11th of February of each year.
 - 84.5 Men. Regardless of sex, and primary dimensions of diversity, every individual, including men, has the right to equality, life, liberty, personal security, and freedom from discrimination hence, the following activities shall be conducted to empower men towards becoming better allies for gender equality:
 - International Men's Day every 19th of November of each year;
 - Fathers' Day every 3rd Sunday of June of each year; and,
 - Provincial Self-Organization of Men
 - Effective Re-affirmation of Paternal Abilities (ERPAT) through PSWDO; and,
 - Men Opposed to Violence against Women Everywhere (MOVE) through AIPGE.
 - 84.6 Youth. Recognizing the vital role of the male and female youth in local development, the IPG shall improve their access to meaningful and purposive participation and further enhance their involvement in local public and civic affairs such as, but not limited to the following:
 - National Youth Day every 12th of August of every year;
 - Linggo ng Kabataan on the week where the 12th of August falls; and,
 - Pag-Asa Youth Association of the Philippines (PYAP) Week.
 - 84.7 Persons with Disabilities. The IPG shall inclusively grant the rights and privileges for Persons with Disabilities including the right to peaceful assembly and association. Pursuant to Republic Act 7277, the IPG shall improve the access of PWDs to public gatherings such as, but not limited to:
 - NDPR Week celebration every 3rd week of July of each year;
 - International Day of Persons with Disabilities every 3rd of December of each year; and,
 - Cerebral Palsy Awareness and Protection (CPAP) Week from September 16 to 22 of every
 - LGBTQIA+. The IPG shall respect and grant the rights of each of its constituent regardless of 84.8 one's sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, and sex characteristics. It shall enjoin all individuals and stakeholders to participate in the following undertakings:
 - Institutionalizing Iloilo Province as a Safe Space for LGBTQIA+;
 - Incorporating diverse and other gender-based concerns with the Cases Handled by VAW
 - Programs for Anti-Discrimination of Persons based on SOGIESC; and,
 - Pride Week celebration every 2nd week of June of each year.
 - Other Gender-Based Celebrations and Observances. To further foster gender equality and equity and to raise people's awareness in the province, the following UN and local declarations shall be adopted by the IPG and encourage participation of all stakeholders and sectors including women, LGBTQIA+ community, senior citizens, children, youth, persons with disabilities, OFWs and their families and other vulnerable sectors:
 - International Day of Non-Violence on the 2nd of October of every year;
 - World Day Against Trafficking in Persons on the 30th of July of every year;
 - World AIDS Day on the 1st of December of every year;
 - Philippine National HIV Prevention Month every July of each year;
 - National Infection Prevention and Control Week every 2nd week of July of each year; and,
 - Migrant Workers Day every June 10 of each year.

ARTICLE XVI GENDER IN ENVIRONMENT AND NATURAL RESOURCE MANAGEMENT AND CONSERVATION

SECTION 85. Statement of Policy. The Iloilo Provincial Government recognizes the vital role of women in environment and natural resource management and conservation hence, it shall endeavor to address gender gaps in these areas towards achieving a sustainable and balanced ecosystem.

SECTION 86. Adoption of the Dublin-Rio Principles on Water and Sustainable Development. The IPG shall adopt the following four (4) Dublin-Rio principles which was also adapted and elaborated by the Global Water Partnerships towards gender-responsive and sustainable management and use of water:

- 86.1 Water is a finite and vulnerable resource. Fresh water is a finite and vulnerable resource, essential to sustain life, development and the environment of both women and men;
- 86.2 Participatory approach. Water development and management should be based on a participatory approach, involving both female and male users, planners, and policy-makers at all levels and that overall framework shall consider gender:
- 86.3 Role of women. Women play a central part in the provision, management and safeguarding of
- Social and economic value of water. Having access to clean water is a basic right of every 86.4 human being. The IPG therefore, shall endeavor to recognize the social and economic value of water to achieve equitable use and encourage conservation and protection of water resources.

SECTION 87. Improved Access to Safe and Potable Water. All individuals, families and sectors, including women, children, senior citizens, persons with disabilities, and other vulnerable sectors, need access to safe and potable water. Towards this end, the IPG shall adopt gender-responsive measures to provide easy and convenient access to safe and potable water prioritizing those in GIDA.

SECTION 88. Adoption of Gender-Responsive Environment Protection and Enhancement Measures. This Code hereby adopts all relevant and existing provisions of the local environmental ordinances, national environment laws, issuances and promulgations on air quality, traffic situation, industrial pollution control, water quality, waste water disposal, special liquid waste disposal, solid waste management, noise pollution, the protection and enhancement of water quality in rivers and other bodies of water and other environmental concerns. Further, the IPG shall sustain and institutionalize the Limpyo Iloilo Program with the Women-Led Province-wide Limpyo Iloilo as one of its thematic

SECTION 89. Addressing Gender Gap in Sustainable Energy. Recognizing that women play vital role in household energy consumption, management, and decision, the IPG shall improve women's access to participation in planning, financing, execution, implementation, and evaluation of projects related to sustainable energy. It shall also promote and encourage women's improved access to the power sector, other than being household energy consumers and managers, as producers, technicians, and entrepreneurs in sustainable energy.

ARTICLE XVII **GENDER AND DISABILITIES**

and gender variability, are part of the Iloilo Province and have the same rights as others that shall not be perceived by the Iloilo Provincial Government and its constituents as welfare services. They shall be given full support for the improvement of their total well-being and for their integration to the mainstream of society.

Towards this end, the IPG shall exert all efforts to remove all social, cultural, economic, environmental and attitudinal barriers that are prejudicial to persons with disabilities. It shall adopt gender-responsive and inclusive policies, create non-handicapping environment, and implement programs, projects, and deliver services ensuring rehabilitation, self-development and self-reliance of persons with disabilities

SECTION 91. Protection of Persons with Disabilities. The IPG shall ensure that all rights, benefits, and privileges for persons with disabilities are protected, as guaranteed in the Magna Carta for Persons with Disabilities.

SECTION 92. Establishing Institutional Mechanism to Implement PPAs for Persons with Disabilities. Pursuant to RA 11070 and other relative issuances, the IPG shall ensure the following:

- Establishment of PDAO shall have at least four (4) human resource on a permanent status:
 - a. One to serve as Head of PDAO; and.
 - b. Three (3) to serve as technical/administrative staff:
- 92.2 General Assembly's nomination of at least three (3) qualified applicants for Head of PDAO positions;
- 92.3 Appointment of Head of PDAO; and,
- Creation of the Provincial Council on Disability Affairs (PCDA). 92.4

SECTION 93. Representation of Persons with Disabilities in Local Special Bodies and Other Committees. To facilitate gender mainstreaming relative to the needs of male and female Persons with Disabilities, the IPG shall encourage organization and accreditation of existing PWD organizations that are required prior to membership in various local specials bodies and committees such as, but not limited to, the following

- 93.1 Provincial Development Council (PDC);
- 93.2 Provincial Health Board (PHB);
- 93.3 Provincial Council for Anti-Trafficking in Persons and Violence Against Women and their Children
- 93.4 Provincial Council for the Protection of Children (PCPC);
- 93.5 Provincial Convergence Committee; and,
- Provincial Scholarship Management Board for Persons with Disability (PSMBPWD). 93.6

CHAPTER 3 INSTITUTIONAL MECHANISMS AND OTHER SUPPORT SERVICES AND STRATEGIES

ARTICLE I

ESTABLISHMENT OF ILOILO PROVINCIAL GENDER AND DEVELOPMENT FOCAL POINT SYSTEM (GFPS)

Gender and Development Focal Point System (GFPS) of Iloilo Province. The IPG shall establish and strengthen its Gender and Development Focal Point System (GFPS) to accelerate gender mainstreaming in the programs, projects, activities, and processes of the Province. The GFPS shall ensure and sustain the IPG's critical consciousness in supporting GAD and women's empowerment, and shall respond to gender issues. It shall also take a lead role in direction setting, advocacy, planning, monitoring and evaluation.

The Governor shall sign appropriate issuances to institutionalize the establishment, reconstitution, and/or strengthening of its GFPS. Comprising the IPG GFPS are the Executive Committee to be known as the "Provincial Gender and Development Council (PGADC)," the Provincial Gender and Development Technical Working Group (PGAD-TWG), Provincial Gender and Development Monitoring and Evaluation (PGAD-M&E) Team, and the Provincial Gender and Development Office.

- Composition and Functions of Provincial Gender and Development Council (PGADC). The Provincial Gender and Development Council (PGADC) shall be composed of LCE as the Chair and shall have the LGU Department Heads and/or Asst. Department Heads, Chairs of the Sanggunian Committees on Women, Children and Family, and Appropriations; and representatives from the PNP's Women's Desk, Indigenous Peoples (IPs), Persons with Disabilities (PWDs), private sector, academe and recognized and/or accredited nongovernment organizations (NGOs) as well as women associations as members. The Sanggunian Kabataan (SK) Federation President may be invited as member of the PGADC. The LCE may also designate an alternate Chair and Vice-Chair for the PGADC.
 - The Governor, being the Chairperson of the PGADC, shall:
 - Issue policies, and/or directives that support gender mainstreaming in the policies, a.1 plans, programs, projects, activities, services, budget, systems, processes and procedures of the IPG including the creation, strengthening, modification, and/or reconstitution of the GFPS; and,
 - a.2 Ensure the implementation of the GAD Plan and Budget, and approve the GAD Accomplishment Report and other GAD-related reports of the LGU as may be required by Implementing Rules and Regulations of RA 9710, also known as the "Magna Carta of Women," and PCW-DILG-DBM-NEDA Joint Memorandum Circular No. 2013-01, duly endorsed by the PGADC and with assistance from the PGAD-TWG.
 - The PGADC shall:
 - Provide policy advice to the Governor to support and strengthen the GFPS and its b.1 gender mainstreaming efforts;
 - Direct the identification of GAD strategies, PPAs, and targets based on the results of b.2 gender analysis and gender assessment, taking into account the identified priorities of the LGU and the gender issues and concerns faced by the LGU's constituents and
 - Ensure the timely submission of the LGU GPB, GAD AR and other GAD-related reports to the DILG which shall be consolidated for submission to PCW and appropriate oversight agencies:
 - Ensure the effective and efficient implementation of the GAD PPAs and the judicious b.4 utilization of the GAD budget:
 - Build and strengthen the partnership of the LGU with concerned stakeholders such b.5 as women's groups or CSOs, national government agencies, GAD experts and advocates, among others in pursuit of gender mainstreaming; and,
 - Recommend awards and/or incentives to recognize outstanding GAD PPAs or b.6 individuals who have made exemplary contributions to GAD.
- Composition and Functions of Provincial Gender and Development Technical Working Group (PGAD-TWG). The Provincial Gender and Development Technical Working Group (PGAD-TWG) shall be composed of, but not limited to, key staff from the various IPG offices/departments or committees represented in the PGADC, including a representative from the LCE's office, members from the private sector, academe and civil society organizations as appropriate. The PGAD TWG Chair shall be elected from among the PGAD-TWG members. The designation of the PGAD-TWG Chair shall be made official through the issuance of a Memorandum duly signed by the LCE and endorsed by his or her immediate supervisor or concerned LGU Department Head. The PGAD-TWG Chair may designate a secretariat to assist the TWG in its functions. The PGAD-TWG shall:
 - Facilitate the gender mainstreaming efforts of the IPG through the GAD planning and budgeting process;
 - Formulate the IPG GAD Plan and Budget (GPB) in response to the gender gaps and issues faced by its constituents including the employees;
 - Assist on the capacity and competency development of and provide technical assistance to the offices or units of the IPG. In this regard, the PGAD-TWG shall work with the

- Human Resource Management and Development Office (HRMDO) on the development and implementation of a capacity development program on GAD for its employees, as
- Coordinate with the various units/offices of the IPG and ensure its meaningful participation in strategic and annual planning exercise on GAD including the preparation, consolidation and submission of GPB;
- Lead the conduct of advocacy activities and the development of information, education and communication (IEC) materials to ensure critical support of local elective officials, department heads and staff, and relevant stakeholders to the GFPS and to gender
- Prepare and consolidate IPG GAD Accomplishment Report and other GAD-related reports; and,
- Provide regular updates and recommendations to the Governor or to the PGADC regarding GFPS activities and the progress of the IPG in gender mainstreaming based on the feedback and reports of concerned offices/units, stakeholders and constituents
- Provincial Gender and Development Monitoring and Evaluation (PGAD-M&E) Team. The Provincial Gender and Development Monitoring and Evaluation (PGAD-M&E) Team shall be composed of the PGAD-TWG Chair, Heads of the Provincial Planning and Development Office (PPDO), Human Resource Management and Development Office (HRMDO), Budget Office, and DILG Provincial Office. Representatives from these offices may also be designated by the Heads to serve as members of the PGAD-M&E Team. Other members that shall also be included are the representatives of the Governor, Civil Society Organizations (CSOs) specifically from women's organization and the academe. The PGAD-M&E team shall invite the concerned implementing office of the GAD PPAs during the monitoring and evaluation period. The PGAD-M&E Team shall perform the following functions:
 - Evaluate the outcomes of the LGU GAD policies, programs and projects;
 - Monitor the implementation of GAD-related PPAs and suggest corrective measures to improve their implementation;
 - Coordinate with the different offices and committees of the GAD programs, projects and activities (PPAs) during the monitoring and evaluation period;
 - Facilitate the participation of the stakeholders such as women and men constituents and program/project beneficiaries by consulting them and documenting their feedback, lessons learned and insights in the evaluation reports:
 - Prepare the end-of-term GAD Evaluation Report to serve as inputs to local policy-making and planning including GAD planning, programming, budgeting and implementation of the next local administration; and,
 - Prepare IPG Annual Status Report on the Institutional Mechanisms for Gender
- Establishment of Iloilo Provincial Gender and Development Resource Division under the Provincial Planning and Development Office. The IPG shall establish the Iloilo Provincial Gender and Development Resource Division under the Provincial Planning and Development Office that will support and coordinate all GAD-related PPAs and concerns of the GFPS of the Iloilo

To ensure functionality of the Iloilo Provincial GAD Resource Division, the Province of Iloilo shall create the following positions, to wit:

- (1) Development Management Officer IV (SG 22);
- (1) Development Management Officer II for Training, Technical Assistance and Advocacy (SG 15);
- (1) Development Management Officer II for Programs and Projects (SG 15), and,
- (1) Administrative Officer I (SG 11).

PPDO Gender and Development Resource Division Structure PGDH (1) Administrative Officer I (SG 11) Gender and Development Resource Div (1) Development Management Officer IV (SG 22) (1) Development Management (1) Development Management Officer II for Training, technical Officer II for Programs and Assistance, and Advocacy Projects (SG 15) (SG 15)

- Duties and Functions. The Iloilo Provincial GAD Resource Division shall perform the following 1.5
 - Assist the PGADC in ensuring Gender Mainstreaming in all aspects of the governance in IPG; Assist the PGADC and the PGAD-TWG in the performance of their roles and responsibilities;
 - Develop and strengthen linkages and partnerships with the local offices of National Government Agencies (NGAs), private sector, academe, Official Development Assistance (ODA) partners and other stakeholders in pursuit of their gender mainstreaming efforts;
 - Provide technical assistance to 43 City/Municipal LGUs within Iloilo Prov Gender Analysis, Gender mainstreaming, GAD Planning and Budgeting, and Gender Assessment such as, but not limited to the Harmonized Gender and Development Guidelines (HGDG), Gender Responsive LGU (GeRL) Assessment Tool, and Results-Based Management (RBM);
 - Ensure that the IPG GAD Plan and Budget is at least 5% and utilization of not less than 5% of the total IPG budget;
 - Formulate and update the Iloilo Province GAD Code every five (5) years or more frequent when deemed necessary;
 - Facilitate the establishment and updating of the Iloilo Province GAD database;
 - Assist in organizing and capacitating the PCAT-VAWC and PCPC;
 - Monitor IPG submission of all required GAD-related reports to the DILG; and,
 - Shall serve as the GFPS Secretariat.

ARTICLE II RECONSTITUTION OF THE PROVINCIAL COMMITTEE AGAINST TRAFFICKING AND VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND THEIR CHILDREN (PCAT-VAWC)

Composition of the PCAT-VAWC. The IPG shall reconstitute and ensure functionality of the Provincial Committee Against Trafficking and Violence Against Women and their Children (PCAT-VAWC) to oversee implementation of RA 9262 and RA 9208 as amended by RA 10364 in the Province of Iloilo. It shall be composed of the following:

 - Provincial Planning and Development Office

- Heads of Provincial or Field Offices of the following National Government Agencies:

 - **TESDA**
 - DOLE DepEd
 - Civil Service Commission
 - Iloilo Police Provincial Office

- Head Iloilo Provincial Prosecution Office
- Provincial GAD Council
- President of Liga ng mga Barangay Provincial Chapter
- Non-Government Organization Representatives of the following sectors:

 - Overseas Filipino Workers

SECTION 2. Powers, Functions and Responsibilities of the PCAT-VAWC. The PCAT-VAWC shall have powers, functions and responsibilities similar to its national and regional counterparts and those prescribed by existing laws pertinent to trafficking in persons and VAWC.

SECTION 3. Secretariat. The Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office shall serve as the Secretariat of the PCAT-VAWC. It shall perform the following functions:

- Oversee the technical and administrative preparation for convening regular committee meetings and special meetings, and technical working group meetings, as necessary;
- Prepare minutes of the meetings and other proceedings; 3.2
- Prepare timely reports about progress in the implementation of VAW-related programs, projects, 3.3 and activities and other reportorial requirements; and,
- 3.4 Guide the preparation and finalization of reports/documents/resolution for review and approval of the Secretariat Head and Committee members

SECTION 4. Composition of the PCAT-VAWC Technical Working Group. The PCAT-VAWC TWG shall be composed of the following:

- Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office;
- 4.2 Iloilo Provincial Prosecution Office;
- 4.3 Provincial Health Office;
- 4.4 Iloilo Police Provincial Office;
- 4.5 Accredited CSO (Province of Iloilo); and,
- DILG (Province of Iloilo). 4.6

SECTION 5. Functions and Responsibilities of the PCAT-VAWC TWG. The functions and responsibilities of the PCAT-VAWC TWG shall be determined by the Committee.

SECTION 6. Creation, Functions, and Responsibilities of the Provincial Inter-agency Monitoring Team (IMT). The composition of the Provincial IMT shall be the same with the composition of the PCAT-VAWC TWG except that the DILG (Province of Iloilo) serves as the Chairperson. The functions and responsibilities of the Provincial IMT shall also be determined by the Committee.

ARTICLE III **Establishment And Maintenance of GAD Database**

SECTION 1. Establishment and Maintenance of GAD Database. The IPG shall establish and maintain, and update its local GAD database as mandated by the Magna Carta of Women to serve as basis for gender-responsive planning, programming, and policy formulation. It shall contain sex, age, and disability-disaggregated data. Results of the Community-Based Monitoring System (CBMS), the National Household Targeting System for Poverty Reduction (NHTS-PR), the Social Welfare Information Technology and Communication Hub (SWITCH) of PSWDO, and other existing systems may also form part of the GAD database of Iloilo Province.

CHAPTER 4 APPROPRIATIONS, PENAL AND FINAL PROVISIONS

ARTICLE I **APPROPRIATIONS**

SECTION 1. Appropriation for the GAD Unit. The minimum amount of FIVE MILLION Pesos (Php5,000,000.00) necessary to carry out the provision particularly for the GAD Unit or Office shall be chargeable against the budget of the Provincial Planning and Development Office and shall be included in the subsequent annual or supplemental budget of the Province of Iloilo.

SECTION 2. Appropriation for Other Provisions. The amount necessary to carry out provisions other than those to be carried out by the GAD Unit or Office shall be charged to the budget of corresponding offices that leads the program and services. It shall also be included in the subsequent annual or supplemental budget of the Province of Iloilo.

ARTICLE II **APPLICABILITY OF PENAL STATUTES**

SECTION 1. Applicability of Revised Penal Code and Special Statutes. Any act or omission violative of any provision of this Ordinance which is defined and penalized under the Revised Penal Code or any special statute shall be prosecuted and penalized under the applicable law.

ARTICLE III **FINAL PROVISIONS**

Repealing Clause. All ordinances, resolutions, circulars, memoranda, or rules and regulations inconsistent with the provisions of this Code are hereby repealed or modified accordingly.

SECTION 2. Separability Clause. If, for any reason, any portion or provision of this Code is declared unconstitutional or invalid, the other sections or provisions hereof which are not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

SECTION 3. Supplementary Clause. On matters not provided for in this Code, existing applicable laws and their corresponding Implementing Rules and Regulations, as well as Executive Orders and other relevant issuances issued in "pari materia", shall apply in a suppletory manner.

SECTION 4. Implementation of this Code. To properly implement this Code, the PGADC shall formulate such necessary rules and regulations which shall be embodied in an appropriate Executive Order to be issued by the Provincial Governor.

SECTION 5. Effectivity Clause. This Code shall take effect after compliance with the posting and publication requirements.
